SURPRISE TO THE EUROPEANS.

Crittenden Robinson's Trap-Shooting a Revelation.

The Californian Winning Fame and Shells Across the Big Ocean.

A couple of weeks ago a cablegram from Europe told how Crittenden Robinson, the California wing-shooter, had defeated the great English shooter, Orchardson, in a return match at Nice, by a score of 96 pigeons to 94.

"Pronounced among the shooters—be either wins or divides nearly every year is Mr. Robinson, famous as a pigeon shot in San Francisco, of which town he is an inhabitant.

At Cap Dall, where the Tir took place yesterday, Mr. Robinson won or divided every pool, save a match with that well-known shot, Mr. Orchardson, a young English gentleman, whose very appearance suggests skill in all athletic exercises.

There are other American shooters here who will take part in the different events of the Grand Prix—but none of them inspire us with the same confidence that does Mr. Robinson. J. Denby is shooting well, has divided or won several pools, but we will pin our faith upon Mr. Robinson, and feel assured that whoever beats him will win, to use a sporting phrase.

In his match with Beresford Robinson defeated that gentleman by a score of 92 to 89, making what is claimed to be a new record for Europe.

SAFE AND ECONOMICAL. The Elevator and Water Plant in the State Capitol.

Those whose duty it is to visit the State Capitol daily or who go there for pleasure and ride on the elevator, hardly appreciate the work that has been done to make that machine absolutely safe.

In the first place, the power behind it is ample, in any event, to raise 2,000 pounds at any desired speed.

The engines pump the water from the tanks into the cylinders so as always to maintain therein not less than 110 or more than 125 pounds pressure, and the reserve water is sufficient to flood the whole building immediately in case of fire.

A new plant devised by a Sacramento man has been put into the engine room, and this is what is known as an automatic steam blast for burning fuel anthracite coal.

This maintains a steady pressure of steam from 75 to 75 pounds. The moment the steam falls to 75 pounds the blast is turned on and continues to blow till the pressure is raised to 75 pounds, when it instantly dies off without any work by the engineer.

It has effected a saving of more than 10 per cent. in the cost of the fuel already, and has proved the only effective means of maintaining a steady pressure on the boilers without the aid of a large force of men.

The California Pacific Railroad Company, one of the defendants in the suit of E. J. Croly to prevent the Supervisors from paying the balance due on the contract for the construction of the wagon bridge above the railroad bridge that spans the Sacramento River opposite this city, has filed its answer to the amended cross complaint, through its attorney, A. L. Hart.
