

THE MAJOR'S NEGATIVE DAY.

Yesterday was a busy day with the Supervisors, and notwithstanding the time consumed in discussing the scandal precipitated by Curtis concerning the alleged use of money in connection with the election of Coroner in 1895, the board managed to dispose of considerable business. The members were all pretty "keyed up" by the affair of the forenoon, and there was considerable ginger displayed in the discussion of various matters.

The Committee on Contracts reported in relation to the motor and pump at the County Hospital, that they had inspected them and found them properly installed and in good condition, and advised their acceptance.

Supervisor Morrison said that electrician Lyman had agreed to put in a 26-inch wheel in place of the one there, which would then pump all the water needed.

The report was adopted, McLaughlin voting no.
