

THE MADIE DANGER LINE.

What the Forecaster Doesn't Know About the River.

Last Year He Raised His Limit to Twenty-Eight Feet, But Has Forgotten It.

The river was one inch higher yesterday than on Saturday, having reached 23 feet 7 inches.

By the way, what has become of McAdie's promise to change his ridiculous danger line to 28 feet?

The fact is, the weather forecaster is a tenderfoot who doesn't know anything about the Sacramento River, and strange to say, the San Francisco papers—whose editors ought to be better informed—daily echo McAdie's "danger line" song.

Whenever there occurs a good shower of rain he issues a "river bulletin," in which he forecasts high water and refers to his imaginary "danger" line.

If McAdie would come to Sacramento and see for himself the ten or twelve feet of bank exposed along the river in this vicinity, even while the water is within sixteen inches of his self-established danger line, he might be convinced of the absurdity of his river bulletins.

McAdie ought to know that 25 feet, or even 28 feet of water in the Sacramento River at this point does not endanger anything except the tule basins.

In January, 1895, the Sacramento reached 27 feet here, and in March last year it rose to 28 feet, but flooded nothing except the low swamps.

Nothing short of 30 feet of water excites any interest among people up this way, and even then the only danger is to the lowlands.
