W. HAMMOND HALL.

The Ex-State Engineer is Going to South Africa.

Yesterday's San Francisco "Post" states that William Hammond Hall, ex-State Engineer, left London for South Africa last Saturday.

He will remain in South Africa for exactly three months, during which time he will make a thorough examination and report of the great water system which supplies the mines on the Rand. He goes on a contract with Cecil Rhodes, and for the work which he will do in the three months agreed upon he will be paid a fee of \$25,000.

In making this arrangement Cecil Rhodes represented the great syndicate which owns all the great properties in the Rand and about Johannesburg, the members of which are the Rothschilds, Barney Barnato, Weynon, Berte & Co. and the Consolidated Gold Fields Company of South Africa.

The mining interests controlled by this great combine in South Africa have suffered greatly in consequence of the unsatisfactory condition of the waterways on the Rand, and in consequence of a too limited supply of water during the past season mining operations were during thirty days carried on under such restrictions as to entail great loss.

Mr. Hall's mission is to make a scientific examination of the water conditions of the country and to perfect a plan for the erection of an immense reservoir, from which an unlimited supply of water can be drawn for the working of the great mines of the Rand. He will return after his investigation to London, where his report will be made and the plans of the work to be done will be completed.

William Hammond Hall is recognized as being at the head of his profession in America as an hydraulic engineer, and for eleven years in California occupied the position of State Engineer. Golden Gate Park was laid out entirely under his direction, as was also the building of the great Los Angeles district irrigation work.

New Trial Denied.

Judge Hart yesterday denied the motion of the Sacramento Electric Gas and Railway Company for a new trial of the case in which Allen L. Clare is plaintiff. Clare obtained a judgment for \$2,000 for injuries which he claimed to have sustained by a fallen electric wire.

Not Badly Injured.

Charles E. Mitchell, the painter, who had a bad fall while at work in Breuner's new building on Thursday, was able yesterday to get about the house. His knees trouble him the most, but it is thought he will soon be all right again.

The Elks' Ball.

Extensive arrangements have been made by the local Lodge of Elks to make their ball of March 2d a brilliant affair. Nothing will be left undone to secure the comfort and pleasure of those in attendance on that occasion.

A Yolo Pioneer's Death.

The death is announced of John L. Woods, Sr., an old resident of Washington, Yolo County, aged 82 years. Mr. Woods was a native of Baltimore. He leaves several grown sons and daughters.

Committed to Stockton.

Anna F. Hammond, an elderly woman, was yesterday declared insane and was committed by Judge Hughes to the Stockton Asylum. She was very violent and caused a lively scene in the courtroom.
