

WAITED ON THE GOVERNOR.

The Trans-Mississippi Delegation Received by Him.

He Listened to Their Arguments and Promised to Consider Their Request.

The committee for the Trans-Mississippi and International Exposition waited on Governor Budd yesterday afternoon to ascertain his views in relation to signing a bill making an appropriation for an exhibit from this State at the exposition.

Webster, Board of Directors, Trans-Mississippi Exposition attorney, Omaha; Hon. H. E. Palmer, Board of Fire and Police Commissioners, Omaha, insurance; Gilbert M. Hitchcock, Chairman Bureau of Prisons, Trans-Mississippi Exposition, editor Omaha "World-Herald"; William S. Poppitton, Board of Directors, Commercial Club, Omaha; Clement Chase, Board of Directors, Commercial Club, Omaha, director Omaha Public Library, editor Omaha "Excelsior," and their wives.

MCKINLEY'S CABINET COMPLETE.

CORNELIUS N. BLISS THE LAST MEMBER CHOSEN.

The New Yorker Accepts the Portfolio of Secretary of the Interior—McKenna to be Attorney-General.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Cornelius N. Bliss of New York has been tendered a portfolio in the Cabinet and has accepted. He will probably be Secretary of the Interior. Bliss is willing to take the Secretaryship of the Interior, though his friends are strongly desirous he should become Secretary of the Navy. The giving of the portfolio, however, would compel the shifting of ex-Governor Long of Massachusetts, and while it is not definitely settled what position Bliss will take, the probability is that he will be the Interior Department.

The make-up of the new Cabinet, if this probability becomes a settled fact, therefore, will be as follows: Secretary of State—John Sherman of Ohio.

Secretary of the Treasury—Lyman J. Gage of Illinois.

Secretary of War—Russell A. Alger of Michigan.

Secretary of the Navy—John D. Long of Massachusetts.

Secretary of the Interior—Cornelius N. Bliss of New York.

Secretary of Agriculture—James Wilson of Ohio.

Postmaster-General—James A. Gary of Maryland.

Attorney-General—Joseph McKenna of California.

Cornelius N. Bliss, the last appointee to President McKinley's Cabinet, was seen by an Associated Press representative this afternoon. When asked as to the understanding of what portfolio he would hold, he answered:

"As I understand it the arrangement of the Cabinet as already announced is fixed beyond recall. This would leave nothing but the Interior Department for me to take. The fact is that the arrangement has been consummated within the hour and I had no time to think over details of arrangements."

"I have as yet given no thought to the selection of Assistant Secretary for the department."

A special from Washington says: Major McKinley telegraphed this morning to Governor Long: "My appointment stands as Secretary of the Navy."

Long's friends have wired him to come to Washington at once. All the members of the Cabinet are on the ground. Cornelius N. Bliss has accepted the Secretaryship of the Interior with the understanding that the appointment is not to stand if any other arrangements can be made to-day that he shall hold no longer than six months and for less time if the President shall find a substitute.

BABCOCK USURPED THE OFFICE. Reginald Webster Declared to be Superintendent of Schools.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—In the Superior Court to-day Judge Hebard decided that Reginald Webster is entitled to the office of Superintendent of Schools, and that Madison Babcock, who now holds the office, usurps it.

Babcock was elected, or rather appointed, by the Board of Education, to fill the unexpired term of A. J. Moulder, deceased. Babcock claimed he was entitled to serve out the remaining two years of Moulder's term, with electoral endorsement. In November Webster was elected for the remaining two years of Moulder's term.

OPIUM WORTH MONEY. Present Market Price Twenty-Five Dollars Per Pound.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—At the present market price of \$25 a pound, the value of the opium seized by customs officials last Saturday as being illegally imported is \$500,175. In all 23,247 pounds were seized. Before the seizure opium sold at \$12 a pound, but the action of the Federal officials has caused a great scarcity of the drug, and the Chinatown fiends are compelled to pay any price the fancy of the holder of the opium dictates, twenty-five dollars a pound being the ruling figure.

JAILED FOR EMBEZZLEMENT.

Earl Fruit Company Causes the Arrest of J. O. Rue.

His Friends Apparently Hopeful of Effecting a Settlement of the Case.

A young man named James O. Rue is in the County Jail with a charge of misdemeanor embezzlement against him. He was arrested on Monday night by Sheriff Johnson on a warrant issued by Justice Henry and handed to the Sheriff by Acting City Attorney A. E. Miller.

The complaint against Rue was sworn to by George B. Katzenstein, manager for the Earl Fruit Company, Rue having formerly been in that company's employ. According to a statement published in a San Francisco paper yesterday the sums which Rue is alleged to have embezzled amount to about \$3,000, but the officials of the company here decline to give out any information regarding the matter.

Latterly Rue has been acting as manager for the recently organized Blue Canyon Water Company. He is a young man with a wife and three children and is well thought of by his many friends.

Rue's arrest was not generally known until yesterday, though the complaint had been sworn to before the City Attorney and the warrant issued from Justice Henry's court on Monday. The supposition is that his friends desired to have the matter kept as quiet as possible in order to see if the affair could not be satisfactorily settled, as there was no felony to be compounded.

Concerning the matter Sheriff Johnson said yesterday: "Certain parties are finding fault with me because I did not cause to be published the fact of Rue's arrest. I don't see that it is any part of my duty to do this, particularly in a case in which the prosecuting official requests me not to do so."

"The warrant for his arrest was placed in my hands late on Monday by Acting City Attorney Miller. He requested that I should make the arrest personally, after dark, and that I should not make it public. This is a request that prosecuting officers often make for reasons best known to themselves. They know their own business best, and I have no right to do anything that might interfere with their methods of prosecuting cases."

"The warrant simply called for the arrest of Rue for embezzlement. I arrested him and placed him in jail, and there my duty ended. Before the warrant came to me the matter had passed through the hands of the District Attorney, the Acting City Attorney and Justice Henry. If it was anybody's duty to announce the facts to the public through the press—which of course it was not—why should fault be found with me alone, since I merely carried out the City Attorney's request?"

"What the purpose was in keeping the matter quiet I did not know, nor was it any part of my business. I did my full duty when I went to this man's house after night, took him away from his wondering family, including a sick child, and locked him up. It was a painful duty, but I had no alternative. I have nothing to do with any other phase of the case."

Yesterday Rue's mother went to the Courthouse and had an interview with her son and spent a couple of hours with him.
