A GREAT SUBURBAN RESORT.

The Oak Park Enterprise Will be Started at Once.

Baseball Grounds, Bicycle Track, Theater, Trap Shooting, Rifle Range, Etc.

At last all the plans and arrangements for the amusement and athletic buildings and grounds at Oak Park have been completed, the contracts for the work have been let, and by May 1st the place will be thrown open to the public.

It has remained for J. A. Morton of Oakland, a man of means, energy and business qualifications, to accomplish that which so many others have talked about for years, but were unable to put the plans into execution.

Yesterday Mr. Morton completed the awarding of contracts for the buildings, etc., and even ordered the lumber required, and work will be begun at once. In thirty days, therefore, Sacramento will have the most elaborate and complete high-class suburban pleasure resort of any place on the coast.

The plans include a baseball and bicycle track covering a space 600x750 feet, enclosed by a fourteen-foot fence.

The bicycle track will be one-third of a mile, or 1,700 feet. It will be laid with artificial grain Oregon pine in 1 1/2 ft. strips, which makes the best track known.

The grand stand will be 200 feet long, with ten rows of seats, and covered by a roof. The "bleachers" will be 100 feet in extent.

There will be a theater building, or indoor amusement hall, with stage and all the necessary appointments of a theater. This building will be 100x110 feet, and will also include a skating rink and dancing hall, the floor of which will be of 1 1/2 x 1 1/2 Oregon pine strips, mitered from the corners to the center. Performances will be given throughout the summer evenings.

The building will also be provided with a clubroom, refreshment room, etc., beneath the raised seats of the theater.

The theater will be provided with seats to accommodate 1,500 persons.

Mr. Morton has also arranged with William H. Eckhardt for a trap shooting annex to the grounds, where knights of the trigger may indulge in bluecock and other shooting.

Then there will be a 250-yard rifle range for marksmen who have no taste for the "scatter guns." Instead of the usual temporary bulkhead, made of earth and boards, Mr. Morton will erect a bullet barrier of heavy planks 60 feet long. This will be raised 20 feet from the ground immediately behind the targets, but the other end will rest on the ground, giving a sharp slant or incline. A bullet striking this incline will be deflected upward and backward and bury itself in the ground. This will prevent any possibility of bullets penetrating the bulkhead or being deflected to one side.

It will take twenty-one carloads of lumber to erect the buildings, lay the tracks, etc. There will be 27,000 feet of Oregon pine, 18,000 feet of redwood, and 200,000 shingles. The lumber has been ordered from the Friend & Terry Lumber Company.

All of the contracts, except one, have been let to Sacramento men. That one is for a particular kind of work of which a mechanic of this city is a specialist, and he will have that portion of the work.

There are ten or a dozen stately and unobtrusive oaks that will have to be removed, and Mr. Morton will try and induce the Electric Railway Company to have them taken up by the roadway and replanted by the side of the athletic grounds, instead of being cut down. He says this can be done for about \$20 each.

Mr. Morton says the place will be maintained as a highly respectable suburban resort, where families may go without the slightest fear of encountering anything disagreeable or annoying. Every phase of rowdiness will be suppressed with rigor, and disreputable characters will be compelled to seek other quarters.
