

WORK OF SABBATH SCHOOLS.

County Convention Held in This City Yesterday.

Several Interesting Discourses Were Delivered—Annual Election of Officers.

The annual convention of the Sacramento County Sunday-school Association was held at the First Baptist Church on Ninth street, between L and M, yesterday afternoon and evening, and while the attendance was not large, the greatest interest was manifested in the proceedings.

Rev. H. Morton, President of the State Association, was present, and added his quota to the numerous good things said in relation to the organization of Sunday-schools, but the ministers and teachers present evinced the greatest interest in the illustrated lecture by Professor H. M. Hamill of Illinois, International Field Worker.

The association convened at 1:30 o'clock and praise service was led by G. F. Ekins, after which L. T. Hatfield was introduced. He spoke briefly on the subject "How to Hold the Boys in Sunday-school." He submitted that he had never known an instance where parents attended Sunday-school that their children did not also attend.

Mr. Hatfield contended that it was folly for parents to compel their children to attend Sunday-school while they amused themselves elsewhere. Compulsory attendance merely created a bitterness in the heart of the child, and unless its interests could be claimed and retained, the influence of the schools would be disregarded and finally lost.

In conclusion Mr. Hatfield stated that as a rule if fathers would attend Sunday-school their sons would not only also attend, but would take pride in so doing.

The discussion of Mr. Hatfield's subject assumed a rather wide range, and was taken part in by many of those present who were interested in Sabbath-school work.

said that he then went to his wife and told her the entire story, whereupon she advised him not to submit to being blackmailed.

Alsip said he finally agreed to give \$5,000. Of this amount \$500 was paid to her attorney and \$500 to herself. It was further agreed to pay \$1,000 when the child became 3 years of age.

Mr. Alsip said he made out some notes. Twenty-three of them were for \$50 each, one was for \$350 and still another was for \$1,000. The notes were placed in the hands of an attorney of the name of Scribner, an associate of Morgan's.

One day in San Francisco, continued Mr. Alsip, Reel B. Terry, the well-known attorney, came to his office and asked him if he knew that he had been blackmailed.

Then he wrote back East to the young woman, who had married in the meantime, and told her what he had ascertained. She wrote and acknowledged that Mr. Alsip had been victimized, and later on she made an affidavit to that effect.
