SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

SYLLABI. (L. A. No. 179-Department Two-Filed March 30, 1897.) F. A. Carter, respondent; Los Angeles National Bank, defendant; William Deering Co., intervenor and appellant. Garnishment Affirmed.

Section 544, C. C. P., provides that the garnishee shall be directly liable to the attaching creditor for the amount of such credits, property, or debts, until the attachment is discharged or any judgment recovered by him be satisfied.

As to the statute of limitations, if the garnishee is entitled to the plea against the defendant in the attachment suit, he can plead it. The liability created by the garnishment is never barred.

(S. F. No. 368-Department Two-Filed March 30, 1897.) George A. Tibbetts, receiver, etc., respondent; G. Cohn Co., appellants. Action to recover property alleged to have been transferred to defendants within one month before the commencement of proceedings in insolvency. In violation of the Insolvency Act. Reversed.

The appointment of a receiver pendente lite does not change the title to property, and in the absence of a statute to that effect would not authorize the receiver to sue in his own name for property which has not come into his possession.

The "Record-Union" newspaper is hereby designated as the paper in which to publish the notices required by law, to be published by the Superintendent of Streets of said city in relation to the work described aforesaid.
