

FOLSOM IN THE PROCESSION.

Her Streets and Buildings to Have Electric Lights.

Supervisors Grant the Franchise—A Family That Likes Railroad Traveling.

At the session of the Board of Supervisors yesterday morning, all the members being present, L. C. Hatfield, on behalf of Isaac Hyman, presented a petition for a franchise allowing him to erect and maintain for twenty-five years electric poles and wires in the town of Folsom.

Morrison said he would not vote to grant an exclusive franchise that would shut out any one else.

Mr. Hatfield said the board could not grant an exclusive franchise even if it wanted to.

The board granted permission to advertise for bids for a franchise, California Transportation Company a franchise for the construction of a wharf on Grand Island, to extend out into deep water.

A franchise was granted to Mr. Hyman on his original petition for a twenty-three months' franchise.

The contract between Dr. G. A. White, Superintendent of the County Hospital, and the county was read and approved.

McLaughlin asked if the contract gave the Superintendent the power to employ all his own help, and Morrison answered that ever since he had been on the board that had been the contract.

The reason was that unless the Superintendent had full control there would be half a dozen bosses, and the men would not obey orders.

When they knew that the Superintendent had full control, there was no trouble and everything had gone on smoothly ever since he had been on the board.

McLaughlin thought the board should have control of appointments, and that things would go on just as smoothly.

The board had control when he was a member of it before, he said.

A woman appeared before the board to ask assistance in getting to Salt Lake with her daughter and two sons.

They had been assisted to go there by Morrison and the Howard Association about a year ago, she said, but the climate did not agree with them and they came back.

Since they had been here this time they had all been sick and had concluded that they would like to go back there, but Mr. Dale, Secretary of the Howards, had refused to supply the funds again.

Morrison said he had personally assisted her before and did not think, as the county makes a regular allowance to the Howards, that the board had anything to do with the matter.

The woman was given the names of the officers of the association and advised to apply to them.

The Chairman of the Hospital Committee was authorized to order such quantity of rock for top dressing as is needed to finish the approach to the hospital.

Morrison offered a resolution reciting that Jerry Goodman, Godding, Ah Sing, Ah Won and others are injuring the property of Sacramento County by dumping debris from the mines in the navigable streams, filling up the channels and raising the river beds, and that they intend to continue such acts; that this county commence such actions and legal proceedings from time to time as may be necessary to restrain and prevent such injury, the manager and control such actions, with power to dismiss and conduct them.

McLaughlin asked if Yolo County was contributing to the funds of the Anti-Debris Association and on being informed that it did not he said he did not believe this county should do so much, as Yolo County is equally interested, and ought to bear a part of the expense.

Morrison said that in this county the city of Sacramento had to be protected. If all the other counties should say that they withdrew from the association, would this county sit down and allow the sickness to smother the city?

McLaughlin thought there was a general law to cover the subject and if not, the United States Government should take care of it.

Curtis said that the sentiment of the people was in favor of the appropriation and as long as that was the case, he should vote for it.

The resolution was adopted, McLaughlin declining to vote.

Captain Field of the Salvation Army reported to the board that from December 24th to March 24th there had been 11,292 meals furnished to destitute persons; lodgings 3,193, permanent situations procured 21, meals and beds furnished to men for work performed 3,529, families relieved 115, value of clothing furnished families \$500.50, value of food furnished poor families \$136, value of wood given to poor \$7.

The rest of the day was given up to the examination and allowing of claims.

FOR CUBAN LIBERTY.

A Mass Meeting to be Held at an Early Day.

A committee of the Sacramento Cuban League was yesterday raising a fund to forward to the work of the League here that is lending its assistance to the expression and crystallization of the public sentiment of sympathy for the Cubans, to the end that they may at least be accorded the rights of belligerents, and not longer treated as incendiaries and bandits.

It is proposed to hold a mass meeting in a few days and send on to the National League another long list of signers to the protest and petition. Such meetings are just at this time being held in the cities and towns of most importance throughout the United States.

It is expected that the mass meeting will be held early next week and that it will be made a most imposing affair.

NOT THE GIRL WANTED.

But She May be Just as Much in Need of Protection.

Officer Anthony came up from San Francisco yesterday for the girl taken in charge by Special Officer Healy on Monday night, but found she was not Emily Guilmett, the one who was spirited away from that city.

The girl was taken in charge by Healy as officer for the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, but as she was not the one wanted she was returned to the house on Sixth street, where she claims to be employed by a man who lately came from San Francisco.

The story told by Healy of his ex-

perience at the house when he first called there, and before it was known that he was an officer, shows, however, that the girl should be looked after. Her mother in Oakland will doubtless be informed of the situation.

Vagrants Sentenced.

In the Police Court yesterday morning Ed Jordan, Wm. Fairchilds and Ed Pickett pleaded guilty to vagrancy charges. The first two named were sentenced to serve forty days each in the County Jail, and Pickett, who is an old offender, will break rock for a period of seventy days.

Wm. Foley also admitted that his case came within the vagrancy law, but signified his willingness to leave the city. He was given a chance to depart after first being sentenced to serve the county for six months.
