SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

SYLLABI. (Sac. No. 200—Department One—Filed April 3, 1897.)

The People of the State, etc., respondent; abatement of nuisance. Affirmed. Anything which is an obstruction to the free use of property so as to interfere with the comfortable enjoyment of life or property by an entire community or neighborhood, or any considerable number of persons, is a public nuisance.

The fish within the waters of the State constitute the most important constituent of that species of property commonly designated as wild game.

To the extent that waters are the common passageway for fish, although flowing over lands entirely subject to private ownership, they are deemed, for such purposes, public waters, and subject to all laws of the State regulating the right of fishery.

While the riparian owner has the exclusive right of fishery upon his own land, he must so exercise that right as not to injure others in the enjoyment of a similar right upon their lands upon the stream above and below.

Constable and His Rejected Pictures

The story of the rejection of Sir Edward Poynter's pictures at the Glasgow Institute finds a parallel in the case of no less distinguished an artist than Constable. Every one knows that the work of the great landscape painter was not properly appreciated by his contemporaries, but few people, probably, are aware that one of his pictures was actually rejected by the Academy, in a year, two, when Constable was himself a member of the selecting committee.

Directly the verdict was pronounced Constable rose from his seat, and to the astonishment of the committee, claimed the picture as his own. He thanked his fellow-Academicians with bitter politeness for their opinions, which, he said, were the more valuable because they were totally unbiased.
