

SHOOTING AFFRAY IN SUTTER COUNTY.

Two Residents of Pennington Quarrel, With Probable Fatal Results.

John Bruce Shot Twice and Severely Wounded by John Madden.

A Resident of Santa Monica Shot by Burglars Whom He Had Surprised While in the Act of Robbing His Home—A Prisoner in the Oakland Jail Commits Suicide by Inhaling Gas.

MARYSVILLE, April 8.—A shooting affray took place at Pennington, a small town in the northern part of Sutter County, this afternoon at 3 o'clock, in which John Bruce was shot by John Madden, and his condition is critical. The men quarreled in a store owned by Madden and fired at each other, Madden hitting Bruce twice, one bullet entering the right thigh, ranging from the abdomen and lodging in the left thigh. The other entered the left leg, ranging down towards the knee. The doctors are working with the wounded man, and from last reports could not state what his chances were. The Sheriff has Madden in charge.

Both men are well known in the county. Bruce is a young man, unmarried, and Madden middle-aged, a blacksmith by trade. The shooting is the outgrowth of some neighborhood troubles, in which Madden and several young men of the town have been mixed up in during the past year. Madden several months ago applied for warrants for the arrest of several parties for disturbing his peace, but was persuaded to let the matter drop. The latest report given is that Bruce is resting easier.

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL YOUNG. Has Been Appointed to the Command at Fort Yellowstone.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8.—Lieutenant-Colonel Samuel B. M. Young of the Presidio is busy preparing to leave his cosy quarters which he has occupied the past four years, as army orders from Washington have detached him from duty, and appointed him commandant at Fort Yellowstone, in Wyoming, as well as Superintendent of the National Yellowstone Park.

Colonel Young has been ordered to relieve Captain George Sanderson of the Sixth Cavalry, who will proceed with troops D and I to their new station at Fort Robinson, Nebraska.

It will be some time before the actual transfer will be made between the two commands, as Colonel Young's instructions are to proceed to Fort Walla Walla, in Washington, with troops D and H of the Fourth Cavalry and march across the country to Wyoming. It is a distance of about 600 miles, which will be made leisurely. A month may be required to make the trip.

The superintendency of the Yellowstone Park is considered by army officers as a very important position, as well as one requiring rare executive ability. The matter in which Colonel Young has managed the affairs in the Yosemite Park has commended him to the officers in command, and the appointment is said to be one made on merit.

SHOT BY BURGLARS. William Pace of Santa Monica Seriously Wounded.

LOS ANGELES, April 8.—At an early hour this morning William Pace and his wife, who reside at Santa Monica in the vicinity of the Arcadia Hotel, were awakened by a noise in their bedroom, the cause of which Mr. Pace proceeded to investigate with the aid of a match, which revealed two men in the act of ransacking his clothes. One of the robbers immediately commenced shooting, one bullet taking effect in Mr. Pace's leg, inflicting a severe wound, which rendered him helpless.

Several bullets narrowly missed Mrs. Pace, who lay in bed shrieking for mercy. After emptying their revolvers the robbers made their escape, taking with them a small amount of money.

The matter was reported to Marshal Dexter, who this morning arrested near the Arcadia Hotel two men on suspicion of being the murderous marauders. They are traveling tinkers, and gave the names of Philip Straub and George Saunders. They were lodged in the Los Angeles County Jail.

PROVISIONS SCARCE IN ALASKA. Ham Sells at \$7 50 and Flour at \$1 Per Pound in the Interior.

PORT TOWNSEND (Wash.), April 8.—The steamer Mexico arrived from Alaska points at daylight this morning. Two days before sailing from Juneau Hugh Day, a mail carrier from Juneau to Circle City, returned from the round trip, which took four months to make. Flour in the interior is selling at \$1 a pound and ham at \$7 50 a pound. At Forty Mile, Day bought \$215 worth of spoiled ham for dog feed at 40 cents

per pound. He brought out 500 letters. He states that many miners, blinded by the glamor of gold, are rushing to Clondyke without provisions, and starvation is almost certain.

FIRE AT SAN FRANCISCO. Fifty Thousand Dollars' Damage in the St. Nicholas Hotel Building.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8.—A fire in the St. Nicholas Hotel this morning damaged the building and contents of the drug store in the building to the extent of \$50,000. The fire broke out in the drug store owned by George Carroll, and is the store in which Eugene Ware was mysteriously murdered. The night clerk had unintentionally left the gas jet burning near a five-gallon can containing gasoline. The flames communicated with the fumes of the gasoline and the result was an explosion which soon ignited the combustible contents of the drug store.

A series of explosions occurred, but the prompt response of the fire department checked the flames in time to save the hotel.
