

EXPERTS REPORT ON PUMP.

The Holly Can be Put in Good Order For \$2,000.

While It Would Take \$6,000 to Fit It Up With Connections for Electricity.

The City Board of Trustees met last night in regular weekly session, Trustees Leonard, Wachhorst, Kent, Davis, McKay, Devine, Tozer and Pennish being present.

W. A. Anderson asked permission to make connection direct with the sewer from property of the late Manuel K. Dubois on the block between K and L, Second and Third streets.

C. O. Sprague addressed the board in relation to buying a set of dictionaries for its use. A motion to refer to the Finance Committee was amended so as to refer it to the Free Library Trustees and the amendment carried.

COMMITTEE REPORTS. Devine, for the Street Committee, reported that the sidewalks in some parts of the city have grown up with weeds and thistles. He moved that the Chief of Police be requested to notify owners of such property to have the weeds removed. Carried.

He also reported adversely on the proposition to improve Fourth street from R to Y with macadam, as many of the property owners are poor people. The report was adopted.

Wachhorst, for the Building Committee, said he had given out a contract for \$22.50 for frosting the windows and painting the ladder at the Water Works. The report was approved.

ADVERTISING WAGONS. The ordinance prohibiting wagons from carrying advertising transparencies was taken up and read and debated.

L. F. Hatfield said that as it prohibited the carrying of banners and transparencies on all vehicles, it would debar the street cars from putting placards on them to show strangers and others where amusements were going on, which cars to take.

The ordinance was referred to the Corporation Counsel.

OPENING OF BIDS. Bids were opened for furnishing taps to the City Tapper. The bidders were Warren F. Drew, Schaw, Ingram, Batcher & Co. and Holbrook, Merrill & Stetson. The contract was awarded to Drew, the lowest bidder.

The bidders for sprinkling the streets were as follows: Patrick McHenry, John G. Miss, John Wall, Antonio King, W. F. Cutler, James Finnigan, A. F. Silva, A. L. De Rosa, William P. King, James Holland, G. A. Burns, Gus Smith, T. M. Burns, Harry Dehn, F. Lowry, Twaddle & Spurgeon, M. Jackson, Nelson W. C. Adams, W. A. Glover, W. L. Wyant, Joseph Nye, James Frank Brown, S. A. Henderson and Frank Hughes.

Some had a bid on one district and some on all, and it took some time to determine the result. Sacramento and Brown were followed by McHenry, on four districts and to be the lowest on four, the board having decided that no bidder should have a contract for more than one district, awarded to him, in order to give work to as many as possible.

VARIOUS MATTERS. Applications for direct connections with sewers were laid over.

The complaint of John T. Stoll in regard to the gutter on Fifth street was referred to the Street Committee.

The Police Committee reported on summer uniforms, recommending a single-breasted blouse, which would need no vest, and derby hats with gilt cord. The matter was laid over for a week.

Superintendent Croly submitted an estimate for a coal bunker at the sewerage pumping plant to cost \$450. The matter was laid over for a week.

August Gustafson was granted a license to keep a saloon at 918 Second street and James M. Corcoran a license to keep a saloon at 1130 Fourth street, on recommendation of the Chief of Police.

The invitation of the G. A. R. to the board to attend the celebration on Decoration Day was accepted.

A remonstrance from property owners in regard to improving Eighteenth street from North B to E and referred to the Street Committee.

The Corporation Counsel sent a communication saying that he had prepared new license ordinance and one for changing the width of sidewalks above Fifteenth street. He has also requested Mr. Beard to cancel his contract with the city for collecting delinquent taxes and the latter had consented.

A resolution condemning lot 4, W and V, Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, and ordering it filled was adopted.

The petition of J. D. Ramsey for a license to keep saloon at 2940 O street was referred to the Chief of Police.

A long report in relation to the pumping plant at the Water Works was made by Cobb & Hasselmeier to the effect that to repair the Holly pump would cost \$2,000, while to fit it up with an electric motor would cost \$10,000. As one engineer and fireman could run both pumps by steam there would be no increase of cost and that steam was preferable to electricity for running the pump.

Devine opposed repairing the Holly pump, as he said it was evident that next year the city would need a new 10,000,000 gallon pump of the pattern of the new Allis pump.

The report was referred to the Water Committee.

A resolution ordering work on improving M street from Twenty-ninth to Thirty-first was adopted, and also for improving the alley between I and J, Third and Fourth, with cobble.

A report from A. E. Brooke Ridley was read in relation to the installation of an electric plant for lighting the city, which will be found elsewhere.

The report was received and placed on file.

A license ordinance prepared by the Corporation Counsel was read and the same opposed it on the ground that it discriminated between merchants. Under it, he said, the man who sells \$8,000 a month would pay as much as the man who sells \$15,000, and the one who sells \$25,000 as much as the one who sells \$55,000. He would never vote for it.

Leonard said it was necessary to pass the ordinance in order that licenses can be collected. Afterwards any defects can be cured by a later ordinance.

Devine and Wachhorst favored passing the ordinance that licenses may be collected, and it was passed.

Davis, in relation to the committee appointed to draft an ordinance, as he had had enough of it. The request was granted and a new committee, consisting of Leonard, Devine and Wachhorst, was appointed.

A new ordinance, allowing the construction of sidewalks six feet in width above Fifteenth street and south of Q street, was read and laid over for a week.

A plan for a new system of sewers was presented by the City Surveyor, which will be found elsewhere in this issue.

CAPITOL CITY'S POSITION.

True Facts Concerning the Relay Race Contention.

Why the Sacramentans Demand to be Informed of the Charges.

The "Stockton 'Independent'" says: "The Capital City Wheelmen appear to be worrying considerable over the protest entered by the S. R. C., growing out of the annual road race. They have asked for information and have the nerve to request the local club to furnish them with complete details. They forget that it is not a school boy affair, but can rest assured that all of the events bearing on the case will be placed before them at the hearing in the strongest possible manner. As far as the assertion made that 'the home club could whistle for the trophy if it did not see fit to forward all information at hand' goes it might be well to remind the C. C. W. boys that the S. R. C. will donate it to them or let them retain it if they are so adverse to giving it up after losing it."

Concerning the above, members of the Executive Committee of the C. C. W. make this contention, and submit that it is neither evading inquiry nor seeking to retain that which is not rightfully theirs. The Capital City Wheelmen, already in possession of the trophy won.

Soon after the Stockton Road Club filed a protest alleging: "First—The packet was not carried throughout the race. "Second—Some of the C. C. W. riders accepted packmen. "Third—Some of the trailers were started sooner than the thirty seconds required. "The trophy rules provide that any issue concerning the race shall be decided by an arbitration jury, one from each club, to be chosen a fifth."

The Capital City Wheelmen had seven relay riders, seven trailers and about thirty judges, timers, flag umpires and other official witnesses in the several relays. On receiving the protest the C. C. W. replied in effect: "Please give us details, what riders and trailers violated the rules, and on what relays, that we may plead to your protest, and if we find the facts as you allege we will plead guilty. If not, we will join issue and go to trial."

To this the Stockton Road Club replied: "We cannot give you what you ask until the trial, as we have named 'us' as our judge. "Thereupon the C. C. W. replied at length, serving a copy upon each club, in effect as follows: 'We will not name our jurymen until we plead. We cannot plead until you specify. We will not bring to the trial any members who have to be held at Stockton, probably all our judges, timers, flag umpires, riders, trailers and relay witnesses until we have such specification as will enable us to know against what to defend, and who of all these witnesses will be needed. We object to swimmers, fishing and unspecified charges. If you have cause for putting us on trial, you know the facts and can give us such statement of them as will enable us to plead and come to trial. Until you do this we decline to name a juror.' The club nor the committee ever said 'whistles for the trophy'; that is pure fiction. This action members of the C. C. W. Executive Committee submit is fair, reasonable, unevasive and simple honest. The club, they say, desires the public to understand its position clearly, and say that it is not in the least unfairness that its position is sound. It objects warmly to the Stockton Road Club degrading and smirching a gentlemanly sport, heretofore kept clean and honorably conducted, by standing behind such statements as appear in the Stockton press. "It is held by members of the C. C. W. that it is not unlikely, such is the feeling of honest indignation, that the C. C. W. will decline to again enter the trophy lists with the Stockton Road Club until it withdraws its charges, or gives the C. C. W. opportunity to plead to the charges, or to name a juror. "There is also that their club in this unhappy and ungentlemanly contention, which much resembles pettifoggery on the part of the S. R. C., distinctly excepts the Terminal City Wheelmen and the Stockton Athletic Association, both of which in all dealings with the C. C. W. have been honorable, gentlemanly and courteous."
