

GRAVE OF HENRY HUDSON.

An Old Fort Which May be His Burial Place.

Investigations That Will be Watched With Great Interest by Many.

In these columns a few weeks back was given an account of the discovery of an old fort in the pine forests of Michigan, having upon its ruins proof positive, in the shape of a giant hemlock more than two centuries old and a half old, that the fort had been built and destroyed years before La Salle, the first white man known to have set foot upon Michigan soil, penetrated to that region.

The remains of the fort are some eight miles from Lake City, which is situated almost exactly midway between Lakes Huron and Michigan, on the eastern shore of the latter, famous for its pine timber and Manitowish, on the shores of Lake Michigan. A few miles away is Lake Houghton, on whose shores the mighty Ottawa tribe of red Indians had their headquarters. For scores of miles in every direction stretch the pine woods which for years past have supplied the greater part of America with timber.

WHEAT EASY, WITH FUTURES A TRIFLE LOWER. Barley Quiet and Unchanged—Oats Dull and Prices Not Disturbed.

Wheat is rather easy than otherwise; spot is unchanged, but futures are a trifle lower. Barley is unchanged and quiet; new brewing is coming forward and is not quoted; options have been neglected for some time. More Eastern Corn coming in; nothing new in the market. Oats are dull. The market on Berries has fallen in pieces, as will be seen by the quotations; it is not due to receipts, as they are not heavier than usual, but the demand is lacking; some growers have sold down to 3c per bushel; in fact, buyers had it all their own way. Currants, too, have slumped. Some wrapped Peaches bring 90c per box. Best Royal Anne Cherries bring an advance over our outside figure.

Butter is still lower; receipts are large and the demand is slow; stocks are more than ample; considerable Eastern Butter here and a large lot on the way. Eggs are becoming staid, particularly for choice goods.
