

BASEBALL TO THE FRONT.

BERKEYS ASSESSMENT VOID

Judge Hughes Decides in Favor of the Bank.

D. O. Mills & Co. Furnished a Statement in Compliance With the Law.

Yesterday afternoon Judge Hughes rendered a decision in the case of the State of California vs. the National Bank of D. O. Mills & Co. This is the suit brought by Assessor Berkeley to compel the bank to pay \$18,940 State and county taxes for 1895, upon an agreed statement of facts. To the effect that the Assessor demanded and received a statement from the bank purporting to contain the amount and value of the real property of the bank. The sworn statement furnished by the bank also declared that it had no personal property and the Assessor was not satisfied with it, and levied an arbitrary assessment of personal property to the amount of \$805,000. The bank refused to pay taxes on the arbitrary assessment and the Assessor brought the present suit. The decision of Judge Hughes is lengthy and is to the effect that the Assessor only has power to make an arbitrary assessment under certain conditions, one of them being where no sworn statement has been returned. In this case the bank returned a sworn statement. As the Assessor did not subpoena the defendant to appear before him, and levied an arbitrary assessment of personal property to the amount of \$805,000, the bank refused to pay taxes on the arbitrary assessment and the Assessor brought the present suit.
