

FRIENDS OF THE CHILDREN.

WORK OF THE ANTI-CRUELTY SOCIETY DURING JUNE.

Monthly Meeting Last Night—Reports on Which Action Was Taken.

The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children held its monthly meeting last evening, Dr. Charles Van Norden, President, in the chair. The routine business of allowance of bills was performed by the directors, and the society proper then took up its business.

OFFICER HEALY'S REPORT. Special Officer Healy's report was submitted and proved a very interesting one. It is very difficult of condensation but a sketch of what will disclose something of the work in hand. The cases reported for the month of June were twenty-four in number. 1—Boy of 14, abuse of mother. Sent to Youth's Directory, San Francisco. 2—Child rescued from vagrant mother and sent to grandparents. 3—Neglect of mother. 4—Runaway boy of 14, returned to parents in San Francisco. 5—White looking for runaway boy from Salt Lake, found runaway boy. Turned him over to San Francisco society. 6—Two girls 14 and 16, associating with bad characters. Action taken looking for better conditions. 7—Father of three girls and two boys aged 9 to 16. Left them in charge of oldest girl, and the girls falling under bad influences the father applied to the society. Family destitute, no mother. Interfered and all children disposed of except eldest who is over 14. A situation was found, one was sent to a sister in Oregon, two placed in Orphan Asylum. 10—Illegitimate babe of a young girl, abandoned. Compelled temporary care of child by family and finally placed in Foundling Asylum. 11—Case of mother with keeping children in improper company. Eight children. Two have been placed in Foundling Asylum temporarily. Father arrested. Case pending. 12—Charge that two children left without proper care. Investigated and found to be groundless. 13—Neglect of small children by parents. Found Intemperance at the bottom of it. While investigating mother and children were sent to County Hospital. 14—Mother charged with neglect of three small children. Left locked in house while mother goes out late at night. One of her children to be pitied. 15—Woman charged by neighbors with selling wine to children. Her own five children charged with improper surroundings. Found charge well taken. Father denies and promises reforms. And to look for the little one. 16—Report of a mother, that her girl of 15 is incorrigible, and of improper conduct. Investigated. Reform promised and girl having secured employment, it is believed better conditions have set in. 17—Charge of sale of beer to a child. Saw the act but because of interference and received the beer instead of the child, was unable to get a warrant. 18—Poison. Stepmother complains that her husband cruelly beats his small child. Investigated and charge of surveillance. 19—Charge that C. Cruelly beats his 8-year-old girl. Investigated and under surveillance by Humane Officer. 20—Complaint of cruel punishment by a father. Investigated and found father justified in his treatment. Charge by the neighbors. 21—Runaway girl from Reno. Father charged and secured her. 22—Are 14. Found and secured her. 23—Complaint of cruel punishment by a father. Investigated and found father justified in his treatment. Charge by the neighbors. 24—Application by a boy of 17 to have society act as his guardian. Industrious, wants to be a clerk. Capable, but refuses to live at home. Mother deceased. Father respectable and kindly, but claims boy is under malign influence of a woman and her daughter who wish to secure his wages. Investigated. Interference not found feasible and referred applicant to the courts. Parties in case nicely and kindly advised by Judge Hinkson. 25—During the month cases 24; secured homes or refuge for seven girls and five boys. Left with parents after interference and betterment of conditions ten girls and fifteen boys. Sent to grandparents two girls, one boy. Sister older sister rescued girl. Situations secured for three girls. Placed in Foundling Asylum two children temporarily, one infant permanently. Placed in Orphan Asylum two boys. Sent to San Francisco six children. Total children treated and investigated fifty-five.

The officer closed his report with two requests. First—That all persons, especially the children, who are willing to care for deserted and neglected children for a few days pending their permanent location, will register their names with him. Second—That all persons who know of places where homes and home employment can be secured for deserted children (such as the society takes charge of) especially able girls will send him their names and addresses.

Committee on Management of the May Festival in aid of the society reported with details of subjects progress, as follows: Total sale of tickets \$725, from booths and donations \$510.60. Expenses—Help, lumber, advertising, printing, supplies, superintending, rent and car fare \$323.08. Result \$402.52. To this is to be added \$200,000 programme advertisements, as yet uncollected.

OTHER BUSINESS. S. G. Smith, a director, having received from the State, Rev. A. C. Herkimer was elected to serve the unexpired term, and Mr. and Mrs. C. S. King were elected members.

An interesting discussion was had upon the propriety of moving in the direction of establishing a home for temporary detention of waifs until homes can be found for them. It was finally resolved to defer consideration of the matter until later in the year. The society then adjourned.

QUICK WORK. A Lightning Verdict of Not Guilty in the Smith Case. It took the jury in the Frank Smith robbery case about one minute yesterday to acquit the prisoner. They had barely time to go to the jury-room and take a ballot before they were back in court with a verdict of not guilty.

Smith, who is apparently still in his teens, was accused of robbing a companion named Crowley in a boxcar on Front street some weeks ago, but the evidence against him was not conclusive.

He was defended by C. M. Beckwith and Victor L. Hatfield. It was the latter's first appearance in court in a case of any importance, and the young gentleman scored a marked success. His address to the jury was a very effective one and he received many compliments from older members of the bar.

Rolling In. Heavy Receipts of Fruit From the River Orchards. Fruit shipments from down the river piers have set in in earnest, and yesterday morning the steam barge Acme brought up her first load for the season, consisting of 5,518 boxes, a major portion of which contained Bartlett pears.

The steamer Modoc brought up 2,750 boxes, making a total for the day of 8,270 boxes, or nearly double the quantity received on any previous day this season.

Three carloads of the pears brought up are destined for the London market, and were started on the long journey East last night.

Previous to yesterday the shipments from down the river consisted largely of plums, but from now on pears will preponderate, and as long as the quality is good those interested expect to receive good prices.

Shipments in carload lots yesterday morning were as follows: Cherries 1 1/2, apricots 3/4, peaches 1 1/2, plums 10 1/2, pears 1—total 18, as against 8 for June 29, 1896.

KUMMERFELDT ESTATE. The Widow of Deceased Asks to Be Appointed Executrix. Bertha Kate Kummerfeldt, by her attorney, Hiram W. Johnston, has applied for letters of administration on the estate of her late husband, Fred Kummerfeldt, who lost his life last week by a fall in Mendocino County.

The total value of the estate is thought to be less than \$10,000, but its exact value is not yet known to the petitioner.

The deceased left a will in which his wife is named as executrix, without bonds. The only heirs are the widow and her son, F. C. Kummerfeldt, aged 22 years.

Obituary. In yesterday's paper mention was made of the fact that Mrs. Isabella Johnston, mother of David Johnston and grandmother of State Printer A. J. Johnston, was critically ill at her son's ranch in El Dorado County.

Yesterday the news came that she had just passed away at the very advanced age of 88 years.

Mrs. Johnston came to California forty-five years ago (in 1852) with her husband and nine children. For a time the family lived in Nevada County and then removed to Sacramento. Mrs. Johnston was a woman of rare physical hardihood and retained her mental faculties to the very last. She was generous, light-hearted, and of a cheerful disposition that made all about her happy. Her death will be mourned in several counties where she was known and loved.

But three of the large family of children who accompanied her to California survive her—David Johnston of Sacramento, Frank R. Johnston of Colusa, and Mrs. Nannie Clark of Grass Valley. Among her grandchildren are P. B. Johnston, Ed. Johnston, Miss Mollie Johnston, Mrs. W. Prouty, Presley T. Johnston, John R. Johnston, Belle H. Johnston and State Printer A. J. Johnston, all of Sacramento; also five grandchildren in Grass Valley.

To-day Mrs. Johnston's remains will be brought to this city, and the funeral will take place from the residence of State Printer Johnston, at Eleventh and F streets, at a date and hour yet to be named.

The funeral services of Mrs. J. C. Hansen took place from her late residence on Twelfth street yesterday afternoon. A large company gathered to pay a last tribute of respect to the good woman whose sudden death had brought grief to a husband and two small children, the youngest a boy only 7 days old. Rev. Mr. Hoskinson spoke words of comfort to the bereaved.

The many friends of Mrs. Euphemia Elston Nixon were so pained to learn of her sudden death. After a sickness of a very few days she passed away yesterday morning. She leaves a young husband and two boys to mourn her loss. Arrangements have not yet been made for her burial.

WAGNER WINS. Released Yesterday by Judge Prewett of Placer. And so Chris. Wagner did not go to Wisconsin, after all, to answer to a criminal charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, for he was discharged by Judge Prewett of Placer County yesterday after the habeas corpus hearing. Wagner returned to his family, and a big load was lifted from the hearts of his wife and children.

It seems that Wagner, who is a hop dealer, had transactions with F. Luening & Co. of Milwaukee, and the latter claim that he cheated them. But when the correspondence between the parties was produced in Judge Prewett's court his counsel insisted that no criminal act was shown, and that if the Milwaukee firm had any grievance at all against Wagner it was such only as should be settled by a civil action.

Wagner's counsel—W. M. Sims of this city and Messrs. F. T. Tuttle and J. E. Marks of Auburn—based their defense chiefly on the point, however, that Wagner had never been in Wisconsin, and therefore could not be a fugitive from that State.

This fact was proven by a dispatch from the Chief of Police of Milwaukee, and Judge Prewett then ordered Wagner's discharge. The court held that a person could not be taken to another State on a requisition unless he were a fugitive from such State.
