

BUSINESS MEN'S MEETING.

AN EFFORT TO ESTABLISH A NEEDED INSTITUTION.

The Object Not Speculative, but Facilitate Business With Mining Sections.

Several meetings have been held recently of Sacramento business men with a view to establishing in Sacramento an assay office, where people of the mining regions can have their samples tested, and to make it sufficiently comprehensive to cover small working assays...

The idea is, therefore, to establish a laboratory, assay office and testing stamp mill, for the purpose stated. That these things are not here is the cause for the loss of so little trade to Sacramento, and the source of a good deal of annoyance and unnecessary heavy cost to prospectors and mine owners.

They are the mining men are fast discovering the importance of this practical work. At the present time all the samples go elsewhere to be tested. We have not now any kind of an assay office. Years ago Sacramento was the center for all mining business of Central and Northern California, and while it is a fact that the mining counties adjacent to us are the largest producers in the State, and buy largely from our merchants various lines of goods, yet in the line proposed now to be established here our people have had to refer them to other places to have their work done or to dispose of their amalgam or impure dust containing a mixture of metals.

The promoters of the plan say that they are not actuated by any motives of gain from the establishment proposed, but simply to furnish miners and prospectors—and the hills are full of them—their samples to a needed convenience, though they believe that such an office as is intended will pay. There is not to be any d-ding in mines or mining stocks, no promotion of mines, nor anything but scientific ascertainment of values of whatever is submitted, and also purchase of amalgam and dust that the producers may come here with it, and naturally that Sacramento will thereby gain in trade and in furnishing supplies.

The citizens moving in the matter say that the feeling of common interest between the mountains and valleys is now rapidly expanding, and that the recent consultations between commercial and mining bodies have brought about an era of good feeling, and point to settlement of vexed issues along lines of right, justice and mutual interest.

Closer business relations naturally grow out of such a condition of the minds of the people. They argue, therefore, such a movement as is now contemplated it is believed will greatly gratify the mountain people and will serve the city to a high, good purpose. Another meeting of the business men will be held to-morrow (Thursday) evening at the office of Hinckson & Elliott, to which all business men are invited, it being held that the matter is one of vital interest to them, and one that they cannot afford to neglect, because neglect so long in the past of this important matter has worked harm to the city and its commercial interests.

WARMING UP.

The Mercury Made a Grand Stand Climber Yesterday.

The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 98 and 65 degrees, with gentle northerly and southerly winds and clear weather prevailing, although during a portion of the day the weather was partly cloudy.

The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 73 and 52 degrees, and one year ago to-day 79 and 52 degrees.

According to the records of the last few years the weather has begun to warm up a little. The highest temperature on Sunday was 84 degrees, and Monday 94 degrees, while yesterday it reached 98 degrees.

The average was 82 degrees, and the normal 72 degrees, showing yesterday to have been 10 degrees warmer than usual for the 29th day of June.

To show that the present season has not been one of too much warmth so far, it is only necessary to give the number of days on which the highest temperature reached 90 degrees and over 90 degrees, the highest being 98 degrees, on the 6th and 29th.

TAKEN INTO CUSTODY.

Mrs. Waldeh To Be Examined Again for Insanity.

When Sheriff Johnson read in the "Record-Union" yesterday morning that a woman living just over the north levee had been acting in an insane manner he knew at once who the unfortunate creature was.

He remembered that last October Mrs. Waldeh, who lived in that locality, had been committed to the Stockton Asylum and shortly afterward released on a detailed deputy Hinters and Smith to go there and bring her in for re-examination.

As the deputies approached the hut in which the family live one of the little boys ran into the house crying, "Mother, the police are coming!"

The woman attempted to keep the officers out of the house, but they succeeded in getting in, and she was taken to the County Jail and placed in the ward for insane patients pending her examination.

ALL A MISTAKE.

The Private Mailing Cards Act Did Not Pass.

Somehow the impression has gone abroad that Congress recently passed a law, to go into effect to-morrow, permitting business men to have their advertisements printed on private mailing cards and carried at the postal card one-cent rate.

BANKER MILLER EXAMINED.

ASSESSOR BERKEY OBTAINS CERTAIN INFORMATION.

On This He Will Base His Assessment of the Mills National Bank.

Assessor Berkey had a very unusual task yesterday in examining Banker Miller on the taxable assets of the National Bank of D. O. Mills & Co. The questions all related to the assets and liabilities of that bank at noon on Monday, March 1st.

The bank figures are as follows: Collateral loans, \$275,000; unsecured loans, \$1,625,161 1/4; less deposits, \$1,638,696 63, exempt; United States bonds, \$57,000, exempt; mortgages, \$62,248, already taxed; realty and furniture, \$45,000, already taxed; stocks on hand, \$30,537 34; cash on hand, \$307,675 61; in United States Treasury, \$3,450, probably exempt.

No special deposits of money on hand of any kind, whatever, was the declaration of the banker, and he added that it was against the policy and privileges of national banks to receive funds in that way at any time.

Mr. W. S. Wood, the attorney for all the national banks in California, contended that the legal and only method of taxing his clients is that followed in nearly all the States of the Union, that a national bank pays on its realty only, and that the shareholders pay on their shares, and he quotes decisions at length to show that this is the law.

The County Assessor relies more on the State laws, and apparently is proceeding against the national bank of D. O. Mills as if it were an individual.

The questions and answers were taken down in writing very easily, and quickly, except that there was one discussion over the question, "What deposits did you have on hand?"

After considerable fencing between the Assessor and his attorney on the one side and the banker and his attorney on the other, the words "on hand" were erased, and the question was then answered thus:

"At noon of Monday, March 1, 1897, we owned deposits \$1,638,696 63." The dispute over this was not clear to the observer, as the amount was not doubted, but perhaps the counselors had in view some past decision on a high court as to the meaning of the words "on hand."

Wood if the latter would be permitted to ask Mr. Miller a series of questions pertinent to the matter in hand, but Mr. Berkey replied that he did not think it advisable. He had sought certain information, and it had been given—quite fully, he believed—and all that remained to be done was for him to come to a conclusion satisfactory to himself, from the facts obtained.

This concluded the inquiry.
