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TIP FOR TAT.

A Little Affair That is Talked of in Police Circles.

Several days ago Officer Hayes arrested Ed. Sheridan on a charge of vagrancy. Sheridan was convicted and sentenced to serve six months in jail, the commitment being withheld to allow him to leave town.

Hayes was given a tip, it is said, by Ed. Jordan, that Sheridan would return to the city on Tuesday night, and the officer kept watch at the river bridge, with the result that Sheridan was again arrested and lodged in jail. Wednesday morning the commitment in his case was issued and he was removed to the County Jail, after Attorney Frank Sprague had appeared and protested against any further order being made.

Sheridan, it is understood, was the Sacramento correspondent of a San Francisco sheet that recently contained an insinuation that Hayes neglects his duty.

After Sheridan had been committed to the County Jail Officer Logue arrested Jordan, who is said to have given the tip to Hayes, and yesterday morning he was arraigned in the Police Court to answer to a charge of vagrancy.

Jordan entered a plea of not guilty and demanded a jury trial. The case was set for Thursday, the 8th inst., and it is thoroughly aired when it comes up the probability is that it will be somewhat racy, and that the question of "stool pigeons" will be discussed from a variety of standpoints.
