

WILL ROLL IN ON TUESDAY.

TRAINS WILL THEN KEEP COMING FOR TWO DAYS.

Local Christian Endeavorers Preparing to Receive the Incoming Hosts.

Local Christian Endeavorers are having a very busy time making preparations for the reception of visiting members of the order, who will pass through the city July 6th, 7th and 8th.

While it is understood that no extended stops will be made in Sacramento, the local committee are led to believe that many of the trains will be necessarily delayed for several hours, and in such cases every effort will be made to entertain them quite royally.

Robert Cleland of San Francisco, Chairman of the State Railroad Section, will arrive here to-morrow, and will assist the local committee in taking care of the visitors.

The local members of the Grand Chorus, who have been under the direction of Miss Lida Clinch, have been working hard rehearsing the selections which will be rendered at the opening concert, and will leave the city at 2:30 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday to take part in the concert, which will be held at the Mechanics' Pavilion Tuesday night.

The decorations at the Southern Pacific passenger depot are nearly completed, and are artistic throughout. The prevailing colors are purple and orange, both as to bunting and incandescent lamps.

Sunday evening a rally will be held at the Congregational Church, when the local singers will rehearse the parts assigned them. Among the forty-five voices are some of extraordinary volume and tone, and Miss Clinch has worked hard to make them conform to the spirit of the music.

The itinerary of trains, as given by the Southern Pacific Company yesterday, is as yet incomplete, and it is doubtful whether the time of arrival can be definitely determined much before the delegations come. As it now stands, however, the schedule is as follows:

Leave Ogden July 5th—Delegations from Illinois, two trains arrive here July 6th.

St. Louis—Two cars, arrive on No. 4 July 6th.

Texas—Arrive on No. 4 July 6th. St. Paul—One car, arrive on No. 4 July 6th.

New Jersey—Fifteen cars, arrive here early in the afternoon of the 6th.

New York—Four cars, arrive in the afternoon of the 6th.

Wisconsin—Ten cars, arrive 9 a. m. on the 6th.

Ohio—Twenty cars, arrive at 12 noon on the 6th.

New York City and vicinity—Eight cars, arrive 7:15 p. m. on the 6th.

Massachusetts—Eight cars, arrive during the afternoon of the 6th.

Massachusetts (extra special train)—Eight cars, arrive at 1 p. m. on the 6th.

Pennsylvania—Two trains, arrive on the afternoon of the 6th.

Missouri (special train)—Arrive at 12:45 p. m. on the 7th.

Iowa—Fifteen cars, arrive on the 7th.

Chicago—Arrive on the afternoon of the 7th.

Baltimore—Arrive on the afternoon of the 7th.

New York City—Eight cars, time not given.

Indiana (special)—Arrive on the 7th.

Minnesota—Six cars, arrive on the afternoon of the 7th.

Pennsylvania—Two trains, arrive the afternoon of the 8th.

Tennessee and Florida—Six cars, arrive on the 6th.

Chicago—Six cars, arrive on the 6th.

Connecticut—Thirteen cars, arrive on the morning of the 6th.

Michigan—Arrive on the morning of the 7th.

Kansas—Seven cars, arrive on the morning of the 7th.

Chicago—Six cars, arrive early on the morning of the 7th.

Aurora and Rockford—Seven cars, arrive at noon on the 7th.

Iowa and Nebraska—Sixteen cars, time not given.

Estimates are given of the number of persons who will arrive on several of the trains, but there is no way of determining it accurately.

Trains will be run every forty-five minutes, and oftener, if necessary, and the Southern Pacific Company is making every effort to keep them all moving and cause as little delay as possible.

Every available passenger and sleeping car is being transferred to the Ogden end of the line, and there will be but little rest for train men until the rush is over.

The railroad company, however, will be able to carry all comers, and gives assurance that the accommodations will be not only sufficient, but that first-class service will be given.

The arrival of the first trains last evening carrying the delegates, was the occasion for a large number of persons to visit the station to see the strangers, and the decorations that are partly in place.

As the time approaches the choir rehearsals have been held nightly this week, and they will be ready to sing at the union meeting of Young Peoples' Association on Sunday evening at 6 o'clock, and also at the evening union meeting of the churches of the city, all to be held at the Congregational Church.

Miss Lida Clinch, the leader of the Sacramento division of the convention choir, will sing the "Star Spangled Banner" as a solo at the Young Peoples' meeting.

There will be a meeting of the Reception Committee at the Westminster Presbyterian Church, corner of Sixth and L streets, to-night at 8 o'clock. It is important that all be present.

CHARLEY YATES' HARD HEAD.

IT FLATTENED A BULLET OUT LIKE A DIME.

Ione Fisher "Plunked" Him Squarely, but the Lead Did Not Phase Him.

Charles Yates, the L-street negro saloonkeeper, was very near to death yesterday afternoon. As he reached the door about it. Yates has a very thick skull. That fact was practically demonstrated when Ione Fisher, a mulatto woman, held a revolver a few feet above him and fired a center shot, striking him squarely on top of the head.

It seems that Yates and the Fisher woman had some difficulty about some furniture which the latter claimed, and which was in the former's saloon. The couple lived in the same house until a few weeks ago, when the woman left, and since that time it is said she notified Yates to send her the furniture in question or she would make it hot for him.

Whether or not the woman had a just claim to the property in dispute is not known, but what is known is that she entered the rear of Yates' saloon yesterday afternoon, and swinging a .41-caliber revolver over her head took a snap-shot at him, which went wide of the mark.

Yates lost no time in rushing out the front door of his place and entering the adjoining building, making his way to the rear. It so happens that short stairway lead from the rear doorways of both the Yates building and the one he passed through into the rear yard, and when he reached the rear door he made his way down the short flight of stairs.

At the ground the enraged woman appeared in the door of the saloon, and seeing her victim below her drew a bead and fired again.

Yates dropped to his knees, but was up in an instant and made rapid time down the alley, while the woman returned, took possession of the bar, and smashed to smithereens everything that was breakable.

Somebody rang up the police station and reported that Yates was dying, and City Attorney Brown, who was there, accompanied the patrol wagon to the scene, with the intention of taking Yates' dying statement, provided he was still alive.

When the patrol wagon arrived the street in front of the saloon, where the woman still held the fort, was deserted, and Officer Fitzgerald had a hard time to find a citizen to hold his trial while he went inside. In the meantime the City Attorney walked up to the saloon, and at sight of him Ione walked out, all ready to clamber into the wagon, and the war was over.

A short time after the woman was lodged in jail Yates visited the Receiving Hospital to have his injuries attended to. The physician in charge made an examination and found the bullet plastered to the skull, flattened to about the thickness of a dime. The lead was pried loose, the wound dressed, and Yates walked back to his place of business, where he did the honors behind the bar last night, as though being shot on the head was not at all out of the usual.
