

SCHOOL YEAR NOW CLOSING.

TEACHERS AND PUPILS TO BE FREE AFTER FRIDAY.

Inspection of School Buildings—Promotions in Two of the Schools.

This week ends the present term in the city schools, and when the pupils are dismissed next Friday they and the teachers as well will be free for two months.

During the long summer vacation it is customary for the City Board of Education to have the school buildings and properties renovated for the ensuing term, and the Directors, City Superintendent and carpenter have for several days been engaged in making the necessary inspection to determine what improvements and repairs are needed.

Most of the school properties were visited last week, and the members of the board concluded its labors yesterday forenoon. They found much to be done in order to place the buildings in proper condition for the coming term.

The first building visited yesterday was the Union Primary at Seventh and G streets. The brick walls of the old building were found to be in need of caulsing or papering, and the wood ceilings need painting. The blackboards also need going over.

In the new annex the wall covering requires painting. During the term the health of the pupils has been good. In the Washington Primary at Thirteenth and G streets, the rooms in the old building need caulsing or papering, new window shades are required, and a lounge (as in other schools) for the use of pupils who may be taken suddenly ill or suffer injury.

The average attendance at the kindergarten department has been about sixty. Health of the pupils during the year, good.

The Sacramento Grammar School at Fifteenth and J streets was found to require very little in the way of repairs. Some of the walls need cleaning, the basement floor to be repaired or a new one laid, some desks changed and new ones for the teachers. Some of the yard walks will have to be repaired, and the outside steps provided with new posts. The general health of the pupils has been good.

The Sutter Grammar building at Twenty-first and L streets was found to be in a generally unsatisfactory condition. In fact, it has always been so. The plastering is so thin that the laths show through it, and nearly all portions of the interior need overhauling. The boys' yard requires enlarging and the closets will have to be overhauled.

The ceilings of four rooms in the Fremont primary building at Twenty-fourth and L streets will have to be repainted, and the walls of the halls on both floors cleaned; a new roof necessary; folding doors repaired; closets to be supplied with new improved flushing system; new curtains hung; inside hydrants put in on both floors, and the front yard to be sown to grass. There has been considerable sickness among the pupils, but no fatalities.

The hallways of the Marshall Primary at Twenty-seventh and J streets were found to need caulsing, and the blackboards to be repaired. Repairs are required to the porches and steps, and repainting of the same. Inside blinds will be put on the windows, the closets overhauled, and other repairs made.

In regard to the High School, the Board of Education has decided to make no repairs beyond what are absolutely necessary for temporary convenience. The building is wholly inadequate for the accommodation of the pupils now there, and the prospect is that next term the conditions will be even worse. Unless something be done to provide more commodious and better quarters many parents will undoubtedly refuse to let their children attend.

Forty pupils will graduate from the High School this term, and the probability is that twice that number will be sent up from the three grammar schools.

The class day exercises of the High School will take place in Capitol Park Wednesday (to-morrow) at 8:30 o'clock in the evening. They will be held in the open, so that all who wish may attend.

The graduating exercises will take place in the Metropolitan Theater at 2:30 o'clock p. m., on the following afternoon.

DEATH OF N. GREENE CURTIS. One of the State's Most Distinguished Lawyers.

A Past Grand Master of Masons, the Grand Lodge Will Conduct His Funeral.

N. Greene Curtis passed away yesterday morning about 8:30 o'clock from an attack of neuralgia of the heart, while sitting in his chair.

He has been in failing health for several years, but it was not thought his end was so near, but for some days past the hot weather has oppressed him and yesterday morning he arose early and sat down in a chair without dressing, and died in that position.

The bar of California has thus lost one of its oldest and most eminent lawyers of the past generation and one who was known as "The Nestor of Our Bar."

Judge Curtis was born at Raleigh, N. C., on February 5, 1826, and was therefore 71 years old at the time of his death. He went to Memphis, Tenn., in his youth and later came to California, arriving here in 1850 and was an honorary member of the Sacramento Society of Pioneers. In 1853 he was elected Recorder of this city, and was re-elected, holding the office for three terms. He was also a member of the State Senate for the seventeenth, eighteenth and twenty-second sessions of the Legislature.

While Recorder, the scope of whose office took in criminal proceedings and was very wide, he determined to devote his energies to criminal law and from the first to 1884, he was acknowledged as pre-eminent in the State in that field, taking part in the most celebrated criminal trials of that period, among others that of Laura D. Fair.

While in Memphis, Mr. Curtis was initiated into the order of Free Masonry, and after his arrival on this coast soon became a prominent member of the order.

In 1857 he was elected the sixth Grand Master of the Grand Lodge and was re-elected in 1858, 1859 and 1860. He delivered the memorial address at the death of Past Grand Master Belcher, who was Chairman of the Committee on Jurisprudence, and succeeded him as Chairman of the committee. During his last term as Grand Master, he laid the corner stone of the State Capitol. He was one of the organizers of Washington Lodge, No. 20, F. and A. M., and was its first Master. He was also a member of Sacramento Chapter, No. 3, R. A. M.

His funeral will take place at 4 p. m. on Thursday from his late residence, under the auspices of the Grand Lodge of California.

Judge Curtis was a most eloquent and impressive speaker and possessed a peculiar magnetic power over juries that rendered him hard to withstand. He was careful and painstaking and studied his cases and possessed himself of their individual histories and weak points which knowledge he used most effectively. His knowledge of law was large and he possessed the power of moving his audience to tears, so that he speedily became known as one of the most successful criminal lawyers in the State. He always took a prominent part in the politics of the county and possessed great power in the Democratic councils. As an after dinner speaker he had few equals.

SEWERAGE PUMPING. It Costs an Average of About \$1,200 per Month.

At last night's meeting of the City Trustees the following message was received from Mayor Hubbard, in response to a request by the board for data concerning the cost of operating the sewage pumping plant:

On the 5th of this month you asked for a report on the sewerage pumping plant. I have not been able to report fully on the cost of operating the plant by electric power, and in fact I am not now able to state what the Sacramento Electric, Gas and Railway Company will charge for the electric energy which drives the pump.

This plant commenced pumping on December 16, 1896, and was run by the contractor until February 10, 1897. The amount expended for coal, labor, etc., while the pump was operated by the contractor, for 55 days, was \$1,635. We expended during the balance of the month of February, 1897, \$896 13; March, \$869 41; April, \$1,684 35; May, \$815 79; June, \$1,283 74.

The running expenses have averaged about \$1,200 per month. These figures do not include repairs or improvements made on the plant, but are the actual cost of running the plant during five and a half months of the year that requires the greatest amount of pumping. We commenced operating the motor and small pump the latter part of May, but it was found necessary to change the pulleys, etc., so that we did not get to work regularly with the motor until June 18th. Since that time the pumping has been done with the electric motor, but the company furnishing the power has given us no information as to the cost of the power, and until their demand is presented it will be impossible to calculate the expense. Probably by your next meeting these figures can be obtained. Respectfully submitted, C. H. HUBBARD, Mayor.
