

HOW CROPS ARE LOOKING.

GRAPES SCORCHED IN SOME SECTIONS.

Fruit Generally Turning Out Well - Hops Expected to Produce Heavily.

The following summary of the climate and crop conditions is based upon reports received from eight Weather Bureau Stations, fifty-two telegraphic reports received through the courtesy of the Southern Pacific Company, and many reports received by mail from crop correspondents scattered throughout the State.

The week has been marked by cooler, and in many places, cloudy weather. On the whole the weather has been favorable for fruit, allowing grapes to fill out nicely and ripening peaches, pears and plums without forcing them.

Large quantities of Bartlett pears are being shipped from Sacramento. Peaches and plums are quite generally reported as ripening nicely.

Sugar beets are being harvested and show good sugar tests. Prospects are good for a heavy olive crop. Watermelons are ready for shipment.

The average temperatures for the week ending July 26th were: Eureka 64 degrees, Fresno 80 degrees, Los Angeles 68 degrees, Red Bluff 80 degrees, Sacramento 70 degrees, San Francisco 56 degrees, San Diego 66 degrees, San Luis Obispo 64 degrees.

The departures from the normal were: Eureka 2 degrees, Fresno 3 degrees, Los Angeles 5 degrees, Red Bluff 2 degrees, Sacramento 4 degrees, San Francisco 4 degrees, San Diego 3 degrees, San Luis Obispo 2 degrees.

Grand Island—Harvesting over; yield good, in some cases 18 to 20 sacks of barley per acre.

Yuba—Wheat better than expected; all fruits doing well; grapes fully up to the average.

Woodland—Muscatel grapes damaged; poor raisin crop.
