

THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS of the county of Sacramento do ordain as follows: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive faster than a walk on or over any county bridge. Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force fifteen days from and after its passage. Adopted August 3, 1897, by the following vote of the Board of Supervisors of Sacramento County to wit: Ayes-Dreman, McLaughlin, Curtis and Jenkins. (Morrison absent.)
