

FEARS HIGHBINDER BULLETS.

LEE HIM LOCKED IN JAIL FOR SAFETY.

He is a Witness Against the Fong Duck Tong Slayers of Hom Ah Gow.

From present indications the trouble between the Chinese tongs, or gangs of highbinders, is liable to break into active fighting without a moment's warning.

The Fong Duck Tong are naturally solicitous of the eventual discharge of their brethren, Long Yin Toy and Chin Ah Gow, now held for the murder of Hom Ah Gow, and while the Sney On gang has so far succeeded in safely guarding Lee Him, the principal witness for the prosecution, the latter is by no means sure of his life.

Indeed, so precarious has Lee Him's existence become—in his own mind, at least—that he last evening told Captain of Police Fisher that he was "much scared," and requested to be given a cell in the city prison for protection.

Lee Him's request was granted, and last night, at least, he slept safe from Fong Duck Tong bullets.

Lee Him, it will be remembered, is a Fong Duck renegade, and in testifying against one of his clansmen he laid himself open to the severest punishment known to highbinders.

Chin Ah Gow, one of the men held to answer to the charge of murdering Hom Ah Gow, has a rather unsavory record. About nine months ago an old rancher who resided in Nevada County, was robbed here by a Chinaman who answered the description of Chin Ah Gow. A warrant was sworn out for Gow's arrest, but he had disappeared and did not show up for six months. When he finally did return he was arrested on the robbery charge, but as the Nevada County rancher could not be found, the Chinaman was "vassed" and driven out of town.

Officer J. A. Wilson, who returned on Thursday from his vacation, immediately recognized Gow as the man arrested for the robbery.

THE OLD FLIM-FLAM RACKET.

IT WAS WORKED ON A WALKER YESTERDAY.

The Bunco Thief Was Followed and Caught—Tried the Trick on Others.

There is a pair of flim-flamners in town, but one of them is in jail.

Flim-flaming is the art of getting away with the money of a person who makes change for a customer, or does another a favor by changing a gold piece.

A Walke, proprietor of the Washington Market at 1208 J street, is the only known victim of the light-fingered gentry, but that there are others there is good reason to believe.

Last evening a young man entered Walke's place, and had him change a \$10 piece. This transaction was square, but shortly afterward another—evidently his pal—appeared and bought 5 cents' worth of grapes, tendering a \$5 gold piece.

Walke handed him a \$10 piece and \$4 in silver, as the customer discovered that he had a quarter-dollar piece and asked Walke to take his pay out of that and return the \$10. This Walke did, and the customer laid down the \$4 in silver on the counter and walked out.

Walke supposed that the whole story was there, but on looking it over discovered that the \$5 gold piece had disappeared simultaneously with the customer.

He hastened to the street, but the fellow had vanished into and through a neighboring wood-yard. Walke, assisted by a "Record-Union" employe, went in search of the flim-flamner and soon got on his trail.

He followed him down and pointed him out to Officer Bagley, who shadowed him. The man went into N. Zemansky's store at Third and J streets and tried the same trick on him. But he struck the wrong man. Zemansky gave him the desired change, but kept his hand on it till the deal was settled.

From there the bunco man went to Sam Ginsberg's store, and tried to get two good half-dollars for a ledger one. Ginsberg looked at the dollar and told him that kind of money wasn't worth a nickel a bushel.

Then it was that Bagley swooped down on the fellow and took him to the police station. There he gave his name as L. E. Reid, and said he was a barber. He had about \$20 in gold in his pockets, and so far as appearances went he looked like a gentleman.

He is evidently a very smooth and successful operator, and Officer Bagley said last night he had found several places where bogus money had been passed or tendered during the day.

No charge has yet been entered against Reid, but it is likely that several will be, and that the Federal officials will take charge of the prisoner.
