NEW FORAGE PLANT. Experiments to be Made in Semi-Arid Regions of the West.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—The Agricultural Department is preparing to make an experiment with a new forage plant which is thought to be adapted to the semi-arid regions of the West. It is the bromus inermis, a grass indigenous to the Russian steppes. Orders for one or two tons of the seed for plant have been wired to Moscow in response to a telegram from Professor Hanson, the department's agent, that he could secure this quantity by taking it immediately.

SENTENCE COMMUTED. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 24.—An imperial decree has been issued commutating the sentence of death imposed on the nine men engaged in the massacre of Armenians at Tokat, in March last, to penal servitude for life in Tripoli and Barbary.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 24.—For the first time since the control of the Republican organization in Philadelphia was wrested from Senator Quay by the disaffection which prevented the nomination for the Mayoralty of Boyce Penrose, now United States Senator, a regular Republican convention representing every faction in this city to-day nominated with practical unanimity a pronounced Quay partisan by naming Colonel Clayton Mercer for the City Treasury.
