

THE SUGAR BEET TEST.

An Important Feature of the Exhibition at the Pavilion.

Sacramento Makes an Excellent Showing.

Many Visitors Viewed the Exhibits Last Night.

Events at the Park—Six Running Races on the Programme for To-day.

The big show at the Pavilion was in full blast last night and the attendance was larger than on any preceding evening.

The sugar beet test that is being conducted by William R. Gird, the Chico expert, is attracting universal attention.

Fourteen tests were made yesterday from beets grown in the vicinity of Sacramento, and the readings in each case showed over 16 per cent. sugar.

In an interview last evening Mr. Gird said the beets already tested compared favorably with any grown in the State, both as to size and percentage matter.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors last night it was decided to hold a baby show in the art gallery at the Pavilion on Friday night.

The mother of the prettiest babe over 6 months to 1 year old will receive \$25, while the second choice will receive \$10.

Mothers desiring to enter their babies will be given a free pass into the big building, and ample accommodations will be reserved for them.

Entries close at 8 o'clock Friday evening, and judgment will be rendered at 9:30 o'clock the same evening.

The Board of Directors are wise in their generation. None of them will act as judges. They respect the sanctity of their persons too much for that, and do not care to take chances with the mothers of babies who are not first under the wire.

In choosing judges the Board of Directors aimed to get men of experience with babies, and at length pitched upon A. B. Spreckels and Henry J. Crocker, both of San Francisco—far enough away, it is thought, to escape the vengeance of the irate women who will undoubtedly be after their scalps.

Last night was no exception to the excellence of the musical programme. "Cavalleria Rusticana" proved a fine number, as was also "Travita."

To-night Mr. Colver will play a solo for euphonium which, aside from its interest as a solo, stands as the work for euphonium solo which obtained first prize in the competition open to British army musicians.

In addition to the regular programme popular numbers will be played each evening until the close of the Fair. Two or three numbers on Thursday's programme will be cut to allow for the playing of various numbers specially requested.
