

ONCE LIVED HERE.

Something More About Hunter, the Girl Abductor.

The man Hunter, the story of whose arrest for abducting a girl from El Dorado County was published in the "Record-Union" some days ago, was at one time a resident here, having kept a saloon on K street. He then went by the name of Captain Nelson P. Wildrick. He is not a new hand at the business in which his true character recently came to light, for Detective Fisher states that since arresting Wildrick and the woman whom he passes off as his wife he has ascertained that Wildrick has made it a business for years, when striking a town to at once go to employment offices to get a list of girls or women who were looking for work and select his victims.

It is alleged that the citizens of Markus, Or., where Hunter traveled with a large convective, did the same as in Auburn, and the people turned out to lynch him, but owing to the swiftness of his escape he escaped. He next turned up in Washington; then was heard of in Great Falls, Mont., and next at Shoshone, Idaho.

About four months ago he started for California again, stopping for a time in Winnemucca, Nev., from which place he wrote a letter to President McKinley (a copy of which is now in the possession of the arresting officers) asking the President to aid him in getting a pension, setting forth the claim that he had contributed largely to McKinley's election.

RETURNED KLONDIKERS.

Ben Bullard and His Party Have Been Heard From Again.

Frank C. White and Richard Falkenburg have returned from their attempted trip to the Klondike country. They left here on July 26th and tried the Skaguay trail, but concluded that discretion was the better part of valor and returned home.

They tell practically the same story that has been told in the columns of the "Record-Union" through the letters of Ben Bullard and Frank Jackson and the dispatches.

H. G. Smith received a letter from Bullard yesterday, dated August 23d, in which he said he was at Dyea, but had made a contract with the Indians to take his goods over at 60 cents a pound, but he did not know whether the Indians would carry it out, as they were demanding whisky in addition. They are very plous, he says, but do not object to getting whisky when they can.

WILL SOON BE SETTLED.

The Primary Election Case to be Argued on Thursday.

On Thursday next the Supreme Court will hear the case of John McKinney against the Trustees of this city to compel the latter to call the primary election under the Stratton law.

Judge Hughes decided in favor of McKinney, but the Trustees appealed therefrom. The Supreme Court has consented to advance the case because of its great importance and the necessity for an early settlement.

The question as to whether or not the law goes into effect before January next.

Demand a Change of Venue.

The defendants in the case of Sarah V. Chapman against George H. Barton, H. E. Barton, J. E. Harris, W. G. Mitchell and J. L. Miller have filed in the Superior Court a demand for a change of venue to El Dorado County, alleging that that is the proper place of trial, as all of the defendants except Mitchell reside in that county.

Charles J. Hasman has petitioned the Superior Court for appointment as administrator of the estate of Frank L. Whitmore, deceased, which consists of the west half of lot 2, G and H, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, valued at \$500. The hearing is set for September 24th.

The will of Henry Wittenbrock was filed for probate in the Superior Court yesterday, Eliza Wittenbrock, his wife, being the petitioner. The estate is valued at \$80,000, and his wife is left a life estate in it, and after her death it goes to his three daughters.

A Million Dollars' Worth of Silk.

A train load of silk passed through the city yesterday morning, on route for New York and Eastern points. The entire cargo was valued at \$1,000,000 and on that amount revenue was collected at San Francisco.

POLICE COURT CASES.

There Was Not a Very Large Number for Blue Monday.

Charles and Joseph Williams, the small boys who on Saturday were arrested by Chief of Police Drayton for playing ball on the street, received a fatherly lecture from Justice Davis in the Police Court yesterday morning, and after promising to play ball no more, were allowed to go.

John Bagella, who was recently arrested on charge of disturbing the peace, entered a plea of not guilty, and demanded a jury trial. The case was set for Tuesday, the 28th instant.
