

INSANE PATIENTS. The Lunacy Commission Making Important Investigations.

As readers of the "Record-Union" are aware, the State Commission in Lunacy recently took steps to determine whether or not Jeannette M. Marshall, the Scotch woman who became deranged shortly after her arrival in the State and who is at present confined in the Southern California Hospital, could under the statute governing the case be deported to Scotland.

Attorney-General Fitzgerald recently furnished an opinion that the deportation could be ordered by the board, and the necessary papers have been made out and forwarded to Frank Smith, United States District Attorney for Southern California.

The question remaining to be determined is whether the deportation shall be made by the steamship company or the Federal Government, and on this the District Attorney must decide.

As a very large portion of the insane in this State are aliens and paupers, the point at issue is a very important one. Secretary Carver says the deportation is also gathering the facts as to what proportion of the insane in the State hospitals are not paupers but whose care should be paid for by their relatives or from their own estates.

Weather Reports. The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 79 and 51 degrees, with fresh to gentle southerly winds and clear weather prevailing.
