

THE CASE OF AMY ANDERSON.

SOMEONE HAS INDUCED HER TO SWEAR FALSELY.

She Now Evidently Wants to Shield Her Guilty Male Associates.

The examination of Bernard Steadman—generally known as Ed. Steadman—charged with having had criminal intercourse with the fifteen-year-old girl Amy Anderson, was commenced in Justice Henry's court yesterday, but not concluded. It will be resumed this afternoon. The examination is being held with closed doors. There are two other men similarly charged, N. Clippa and Fred Stevens.

The Anderson girl was the first witness. She testified to having visited tamale joints at Oak Park and in this city to see Mrs. Lizzie Wamble, the woman who stands charged with having solicited male patrons.

The girl testified very reluctantly, and denied having had improper relations with Steadman.

District Attorney Ryan asked her if she had not made a full statement to him in his office in the presence of Daniel Healy, in which she had freely acknowledged to him her improper relations with Steadman and other men. Mr. Ryan could not conceal his surprise when the girl replied, "No, sir."

The District Attorney asked her if she did not know she was under oath, and that to testify falsely would be to commit perjury, to which she answered that she did not know what an oath meant.

Judge Henry then instructed her in regard to it, and Mr. Ryan again asked her if she had not made a full statement to him and Dan Healy.

This time the witness went so far as to acknowledge to him her conversation with him regarding Steadman, but she evaded all questions that would tend to establish the guilt of the defendant by saying, "I don't remember."

It was apparent that she was not only a very unwilling witness, but that some influence had been brought to bear upon her to shield Steadman.

Mr. Ryan asked her if it was not a fact that Steadman had talked to her in jail and threatened her if she testified against him, and if he had not handed her notes containing vile language and obscene pictures.

This she also denied, but finally admitted that Steadman had talked to her about being in jail, but said that the notes were in reference to Lizzie Wamble. Here again her memory failed her suddenly, and all endeavors of the District Attorney to get her into the truth, and with the answer, "I don't remember."

She was then temporarily excused, and Mrs. Lizzie Wamble took the stand. She is a coarse-looking woman, 30 years of age, with short hair, which gives her a decidedly mannish appearance.

She testified that Steadman had met Amy Anderson in a private room at the Oak Park "parlors," and that afterward Amy showed her money that Steadman had given her. On another occasion, at a Fifteenth-street tamale place, Steadman had also met the girl in private and given her money.

The witness was subjected to a severe examination by Mr. Ryan. He said: "Although you were aware of the fact that this young girl held guilty relations with men, you made no attempt to save her, nor apprise her mother of it. On the contrary, from your own words, it is clear that you not only consented to it, but likewise encouraged her in it."

At this the witness hung her head, and her black straw hat was pulled half-way down over her face, either through shame or fear.

The prosecution then introduced a copy of a Folsom State Prison commitment, showing that Steadman had been convicted of a felony in Oakland in 1888 and sentenced to Folsom Prison for a period of five years for placing a young girl in a house of ill-fame. Governor Waterman, however, pardoned Steadman after the latter had served less than a year of his sentence.

The examination will be continued this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

UNTIMELY DEATH.

Charles A. Panabaker Suffocated in a Burning Hotel.

Word has been received in this city by E. E. Panabaker of the death of his brother, Charles A. Panabaker, last Sunday at Bieber, Lassen County, where he has been engaged in teaching.

A fire destroyed the City Hall, Ford's Hotel and several other buildings. Mr. Panabaker was sleeping in the upper story of the hotel and the Justice of the Peace writes that the verdict of the coroner's jury was to the effect that he came to his death by suffocation.

He left this city about two years ago and went up on the ranch of Gopher Brook in Modoc County, to try to improve his health and later on engaged in teaching again. He was well known

In this county, having taught here for a number of years and being a thorough teacher by a natural gift for it, and leaves many friends who will regret his untimely taking off.

PIONEER HOWELL CLARK.

He Passed Away Yesterday at the Age of Eighty-Six.

After a long illness Howell Clark died at his home in this city yesterday. His demise had been looked for hourly for some weeks past.

Mr. Clark had lived at Tenth and X streets for about forty years, though his residence in the city commenced as early as 1856. He was a native of Genesee County, New York, and 86 years of age. He was among the ardentists who came to California in the memorable year of '49, and was a member of the local Pioneer Society.

Deceased was a man of means, and lived a quiet, domestic life, seldom making himself conspicuous in community affairs, but always enjoying the friendship and respect of his neighbors. His wife survives him, but there are no children.

The funeral will not take place until 2 o'clock next Sunday.

Weather Reports.

The Weather Bureau report shows the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 73 and 58 degrees, with fresh to brisk southerly winds and partly cloudy weather prevailing.

The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 92 and 57 degrees, and one year ago to-day 87 and 57 degrees.

The average temperature was 66 and the normal 65, showing yesterday to have been 1 degree warmer than usual. The wet thermometer at 5 p. m. was 58, being 10 degrees cooler than the dry thermometer at the same hour.

The percentage of moisture in the air at 5 p. m. was 54 per cent., as against 27 per cent. at the same hour on Tuesday.

It will be seen by comparison with last year's temperature at this time that we were having a warmer spell than at the present time.
