

TROUBLE FEARED ON THE YUKON.

A Large Number of Prospectors Stranded at St Michaels.

With No Prospect of Reaching the Klondike This Winter.

Captain Tuttle of the Revenue Cutter Bear Does Not Paint a Rosy Description of the Scenes and Prospects—Many of Those at the Mouth of the River Without Provisions and the Means to Purchase Them.

WASHINGTON (D. C.), Oct. 12.—Information received at the Treasury Department from Captain Tuttle of the revenue cutter Bear, now cruising in Alaskan waters, does not paint a rosy description of the scenes and prospects in the Klondike region.

There are in port seven sea-going vessels and six river steamers, with one steamer and one barge in process of construction on the beach. About 300 people are encamped awaiting the completion of these vessels. At least seven craft are expected to arrive, many of them with passengers. There is no possibility of these people reaching the upper Yukon this season, and they must winter here or at some point on the coast of the Yukon.

On September 13th the river steamer Milton returned from its up-river trip, having been unable to reach Circle City. Captain Hill reported the river so low that to prevent his reaching his destination his cargo was landed on the river bank. The steamer J. J. Healy, P. B. Wear, Alice Belal and Marguerite are now up the river, but the prospects are that they will not be able to reach Circle City or Dawson.

Laws in regard to the inspection of goods are entirely disregarded, as no inspector of hulls or boilers has visited this place. At least sixteen such vessels are now running in this part of Alaska. If I should seize them starvation would ensue to those who are depending upon these vessels for their livelihood. We are hourly expecting the arrival of another cutter, and when she comes the Bear will at once call for the reindeer station, Siberia, and St. Lawrence Island.

Some of the tents have been flooded for three days past, and all are uncomfortable. It has been snowing for two days, and the whole landscape is white.

THE BEHRING SEA ARRIVES. The schooner Behring Sea arrived here today from St. Michael, which place she left September 20th. The Behring Sea brings no news of importance beyond what has already been reported. When the schooner left the Eliza Anderson expedition was preparing to start up the Yukon. The sensational stories about the threatened lynching of Mayor Wood of Seattle and D. K. Howard, manager of the Eliza Anderson party, are said to be without foundation.

There is an order here called the Yukon Order of Pioneers. Its members have a regalia which they wear on certain occasions. One of the old pioneers died two or three weeks ago, and during his sickness, death and burial, they took entire charge of him. One of the brother pioneers delivered a funeral oration.

There are supposed to be 6,000 or 7,000 people in the vicinity of Dawson City. The greatest drawback is the Government. People are taxed out of claim. The first recording fee on a claim is \$15, the next share is \$100, and for seven years following it is \$100 for each claim. They even charge stumpage for cutting wood at 25 cents a cord, which amounts to considerable where so much is used in thawing the ground.

Even the dead wood on the ground is charged for at 10 cents a cord. House logs are charged for at the rate of 8 cents a log. All goods are subjected to a heavy revenue tax, which is said to be a retaliation on the Canadian Government which will collect \$2,000,000 here between last spring and next.

There is much complaint because the United States Government is slow in determining the course of the boundary line. It is reported here that President McKinley has notified the Canadian Government that a strict account of the revenues must be kept until the location of the boundary line is settled. A representative of the Rothschilds is here in Dawson City.

TROUBLE IMMINENT. WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Sheldon Jackson, United States General Agent of Education for Alaska, writing from St. Michaels, under date of September 13th, has sent a report to the Interior Department regarding the gold boom. He says:

I am still detained at this place, waiting upon the movements of the Bear. Since reaching here, August 24th, several expeditions of miners have arrived on steamers and sailing vessels from Puget Sound, Seattle and San Francisco. They bring with them lumber and mechanics, expecting at this point to build small river steamers and barges, which to proceed up the Yukon to the mines. There are eight or ten of these vessels now in the harbor, and thirteen are expected from the south.

The season is now closed for getting up the river this year. The most that the miners now here can do will be to get perhaps a hundred miles up the river to timber, then go into winter quarters, erecting log huts for shelter. Those that come up later will be compelled to winter at this place. As all these people were pledged to be taken to the mines this fall, you can imagine that there is not only much disappointment, but also much irritation and anger that is liable at any moment to break out into open violence.

Among the hundreds now camped upon the beach in tents are all classes from the best to the lowest, professional men of ability and standing, gamblers and desperate roughs, the wealthy and the poor, and the presence of the Bear is the only restraint of lawlessness. We are hourly expecting the arrival of another cutter, and when she comes the Bear will at once call for the reindeer station, Siberia, and St. Lawrence Island.

THE LUETGERT TRIAL.

STATE'S ATTORNEY McEWAN FINISHES HIS ARGUMENT.

Charges Mary Stemmering With Being the Primary Cause of the Murder.

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—Assistant State's Attorney McEwan finished his argument in the Luetgert trial to-day, and Attorney Phalen will make the opening address for the defense to-morrow. Mr. McEwan took the entire day with his argument, and went over the case carefully, connecting the details of evidence for the jury, and showing how one circumstance fitted into another, and how the whole mass of evidence submitted by the State furnished, in his opinion, a full and complete circumstantial chain, proving that Luetgert had murdered his wife in order that his relations with his servant girl, Mary Stemmering, might remain undisturbed.

Throughout the entire argument Luetgert listened to the State's Attorney, who was asking for his life, with the greatest attention. He never took his eyes off Mr. McEwan for more than an instant, and the heavy scowl that is habitual with him, deepened as the Assistant State's Attorney pointed out circumstance after circumstance that weighed against his innocence.

It is now practically certain that all of the arguments will be finished so that the case will be given to the jury by Saturday night at the latest.

When Assistant State's Attorney McEwan resumed his argument this morning he took up the subject of sesamoids. This soon brought him to a consideration of the evidence of Dr. W. H. Allport, chief osteological expert for the defense. Rarely is a witness handled with the biting sarcasm and scornful denunciation that was heaped upon this celebrated expert.

He came upon the witness-stand with all the arrogance and self-assurance of a bully," shouted the speaker, "and left it as meekly and lowly as any being who ever entered this building. He exposed to the medical profession in open court his moral character, and made himself the laughing stock of experts of the world over."

The mistakes Dr. Allport is alleged to have made in identifying different bones were enumerated, discussed and ridiculed in the most cutting manner at the speaker's command. And, finally, the men whom the defense asks you to believe with reference to the identification of the bones placed before you in evidence in this case," observed Mr. McEwan.

Mary Stemmering was the subject of the Assistant State's Attorney's remarks during the afternoon. He dwelt at length upon her alleged relations with Luetgert, and charged that she was the primary cause of the horrible murder of Mrs. Luetgert. The woman's testimony on the witness-stand was torn to shreds, and she was denounced in unmeasured terms.

Hour after hour the Assistant State's Attorney continued to discuss the evidence in the case, and to comment upon the conduct of Luetgert and Mary Stemmering, both before and after the disappearance of Mrs. Luetgert.

To-morrow Attorney Phalen will open for the defense. He will speak all day, and possibly part of Thursday. Then ex-Judge Vincent will speak a day and a half, closing for the defense. The State's Attorney Denison, who is a remarkably rapid speaker, will close the case on Saturday, speaking the entire day.
