STOCKTON PEOPLE ADVISED TO GROW SUGAR BEETS.

Interesting Facts and Figures Concerning the Profits of the Great Industry.

(From the Stockton Mail.) To the Editor of the "Mail": Sir: I wish to say, through the columns of your valuable paper, a word to the people of the city of Stockton and the farmers of this vicinity on the subject of sugar beets.

It is singular that men should have to be constantly urged and pushed into doing that which is greatly to their interest. Yet this seems to be the trouble with the farmers of this section in the matter of sugar beets. Sugar-beet growing, on lands adapted to it, is the most profitable of all agricultural pursuits in this State. With the knowledge that he has the necessary land, with the certainty that he has the necessary market, with the positive assurance that he has a larger profit than he can expect to gather from any soil in any other way, it seems passing strange that the farmer should be loth to embark in this industry.

The most casual observer must concede that, with the coming of a general crop throughout the world, the price of wheat must decline in this country to an unprecedented figure. When the trans-Siberian railroad is finished, which, it is expected, will be in the year 1900, wheat can be laid down in San Francisco from Vladivostok or Fort Arthur much more cheaply than it can be laid down from Fresno, and the raising of wheat will be practically a dead industry in this State upon high-priced lands.

The farmer, evidently, is not willing to be warned by the awful experience through which he passed during the years 1893, 1894 and 1895, when he was driven almost into bankruptcy and, in many cases, actually into bankruptcy, owing to the low price of cereals. The causes which produced the depression there are likely to obtain again, at any time, and to come more extensively. My information is that there is enough land in Siberia, which has never been touched by a plow, to supply the European markets with what breadstuffs they must import, without calling upon the United States for a bushel. This is especially true of the lands on Roberts and Union Islands, though the lands about Lathrop, Atlanta, Lodi and New Hope bear evidence of equal fertility.

Harris & Lane, Wakefield—16.53 per cent. sugar, 84.4 per cent. purity of juice. William Davies, New Hope—15.39 per cent. sugar, 81.8 per cent. purity of juice. P. A. Kiss, New Hope—15.39 per cent. sugar, 81.8 per cent. purity of juice. W. W. Fogg, New Hope—15.11 per cent. sugar, 83.4 per cent. purity of juice. Ezra Fiske, Lodi—14.25 per cent. sugar, 84.2 per cent. purity of juice. W. H. Priest, Lathrop—14.50 per cent. sugar, 75.2 per cent. purity of juice. Crocker & Dillon, Union Island—16.77 per cent. sugar, 88.25 per cent. purity of juice.

These tests are sufficient, both in the extent of the territory they cover and in the variety of the soil from which they came, to evidence that there is a vast acreage in this county which will grow sugar beets abundantly.

The citizens of this community should do all in their power to encourage the raising of sugar beets. The owners of the factory at Wheatport have written me that they are ready to make contracts for from 4,000 to 5,000 acres, and will take the beets delivered on the bank of the river, on the wharf in Stockton, or at the railway station. Assuming that 5,000 acres are planted and that the average cost of producing an acre of sugar beets is \$45, ready for the factory, we have an expenditure upon 5,000 acres of land of \$225,000. All of this except the cost of the seed and the cost of sacks goes for labor. As seed and sacks can be provided for about \$3 an acre, this will leave \$210,000 to be distributed in this vicinity for labor during a period of seven months; or at the rate of \$30,000 a month, or \$1.54 for every working man—more money than is disbursed for labor by all the manufacturers now engaged in business in the city of Stockton during the same period. Of the sum thus received for wages, the laborer would naturally leave the major portion in the community in which he resides.

The citizens of this city should adopt your suggestion—should organize for the furthering of this industry. Stockton has always been reproached, truthfully, with a lack of public enterprise and public spirit. I hope that you will be able to rouse the people to the necessity for energetic action in this matter.

Many factories for the making of sugar from beets are likely to be erected in California in the near future, and when it is understood that we can and will raise beets, I have no doubt that we will be favored with one, or perhaps more, in this locality. The effect of this would be to give such an impetus to the growth of the city as it has never had before, and which it can expect from no other source.

I send you herewith some simple but complete instructions for the planting of sugar beets, which you may publish if you see fit. Very respectfully, H. J. CORCORAN, Stockton, October 11th.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR PLANTING SUGAR BEET SEED. Keep all stock off the land after the rains begin. Plow deep, break up thoroughly, pulverize the soil before planting. Sow when the soil is warm. One pound of seed will seed one-tenth of an acre, and a crust to twenty-one inches apart. Sow with a drill, forced feed; sow shallow, just deep enough to be covered. Seed should come up in from seven to twenty-one days. Thin the beets so soon as they develop four leaves. Thin out from six to ten inches, according to richness of the soil. Leave only one beet in one place, and that the most vigorous one. Keep weeds out entirely. Do not allow a crust to form on top of the land after seeding, or while beets are growing. Continue to keep the soil loose by drawing a cultivator between the rows until the tops cover the ground. Beets should ripen in from 120 to 160 days from time of seeding. When the outer leaves turn yellow and die down it is an indication that the beets are ripening. Do not cut the tops off with a knife, but twist the leaves off.
