

ROAD INTO YOSEMITE VALLEY

IT IS FAVORED BY THE YOSEMITE COMMISSIONERS.

They and the State Highway Commissioners Will Recommend It to the Government.

State Highway Commissioner John R. Price arrived in the city from San Francisco yesterday morning, and left during the afternoon for the southern part of the State, where meetings in the interest of good roads will be held.

While in San Francisco Commissioner Price and Ashe met a committee from the Yosemite Valley Commissioners to discuss the advisability of recommending the construction by the Federal Government of a modern, up-to-date wagon road from the confines of the National Park into the Yosemite Valley proper.

In speaking of the conference yesterday Commissioner Price said that had covered a wide range, and that the subject of a good road or roads into the valley had been discussed from every point of view. The Yosemite Commissioners, he said, urged that the General Government be requested to purchase and repair the wagon road leading into the valley, but on this point himself and Commissioner Ashe took issue. They declined to become parties to such a recommendation, maintaining that none of the roads now leading into the valley were built upon surveyed grades, and in many places they were steep as to make travel difficult even in the best season of the year.

The Highway Commissioners further opposed the purchase of the roads, because they were not of regulation width and because they were all of repair and in many places they were steep as to make travel difficult even in the best season of the year.

Mrs. Huelsman Wants a Mortgage Pair Off.

Catherine Huelsman has filed in the Superior Court her protest against the final distribution of her husband's estate until a certain note and mortgage in favor of Charles Schwartz for \$1,000 are discharged.

She, therefore, petitions the court for an order directing the executors, L. B. Mohr and C. A. York, to show cause why a sufficient portion of the real property of the estate should not be sold to pay off the Schwartz note and mortgage.

Paid Fifty Dollars for Scalding One of Her Callers.

YESTERDAY'S SHOWER.

It Slighted the Western Portion of the City.

The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 61 and 48 degrees, with gentle and variable winds, and partly cloudy weather prevailing. The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 82 and 48 degrees, and one year ago to-day 81 and 51 degrees.

The average temperature was 54 and the normal 60 degrees, showing yesterday to have been 6 degrees cooler than usual for the 14th of October.

The wet thermometer at 5 p. m. was 50 degrees, being 16 degrees cooler than the dry thermometer at the same hour.

The percentage of moisture in the air at 5 p. m. was 48 per cent., as against 63 per cent. at the same hour on Wednesday.

There was .04 of an inch of rain yesterday between 1:10 p. m. and 1:20 p. m. This shower was rather peculiar, but not an unusual occurrence in Sacramento, in the fact that no rain fell in the city west of Sixth street, neither was there any precipitation in the town of Washington across the river.

The clouds which produced this shower were moving from the northeast toward the southwest, and no doubt between this city and Folsom considerable more rain fell than in the city, and no doubt more fell at East Park than at Seventh and K streets.

On the 20th of July last year a rain cloud passed over Sacramento which gave enough to measure at East Park, but only panned out a sprinkle at the Weather Station, while none fell in the western portion of the city, nor in Washington.

The total season's rainfall to date amounts to .39 of an inch, as against .32 of an inch to an equal date last year.

POSTAL SERVICE.

An Examination for Clerks and Carriers December 4th.

The United States Civil Service Commission has ordered that an examination be held by its local board in this city on Saturday, December 4th, commencing at 10 o'clock a. m., for the grades of clerk and carrier in the post-office service. Only citizens of the United States can be examined.

The age limitations for this examination are as follows: Clerks, 18 years or over; carriers, 21 years and under 40. No application will be accepted for this examination unless accompanied by Secretary William Rider, on the proper blank before the hour of closing business on November 13th. Applications should be filed promptly, in order that time may remain for correction if needed.

The commission takes this opportunity of stating that the examinations are open to all reputable citizens of the United States who may desire to enter the service, without regard to race or to their political or religious affiliations. All such citizens are invited to apply. They shall be examined, graded and certified with entire impartiality and wholly without respect to any consideration save their efficiency as shown by the grades they obtain in the examination.

For application blanks, full instructions and information relative to the duties and salaries of the different positions apply to Secretary Rider, Sacramento.


