



At the Plastic Club in Philadelphia have been exhibited a collection of Japanese color prints. The nucleus of the exhibition consists of prints owned by Miss J. L. Southwick of Worcester, but others contributed by Messrs. Yamamoto and Takayanagi of Boston and many private collections spread the number to 105. They are woodcuts executed with the finesse peculiar to Japanese art, producing pictorial effect with the simplest lines, and combining rich and mellow tints. Many of them date from the last century, the oldest being by Torii Kiyonami, 1710-1765, while there are two of Hokusai's celebrated views of Fujiyama. The modern color printing in Japan lacks the richness of tone that characterizes these old wood cuts, which are as full of color as an old Italian painting.

Howard Pyle is engaged upon a set of illustrations for a holiday edition "Quo Vadis," some of which have been already reproduced. They will be found to be quite different from Mr. Pyle's previous work. One, for example, represents Nero at the burning of Rome. He stands upon the edge of a parapet covered with tapestries, which fall in straight folds, and are illumined by the unquen flames. The figure is boldly relieved against a background of murky smoke, while in the middle distance is a group of awe-stricken attendants.

Has the art of writing the gay song, the chanson, died out in France—the land of lands for gay songs? Two years ago died M. Montarlot, leaving the academy 10,000 francs, the interest of which he bequeathed to the oldest of a small piece of property, was to be awarded as a prize for a chanson. As the academy has received no song which its committee thought worthy of a prize, it has returned the property to Montarlot's heirs and annulled the foundation.

If France no longer makes or un-makes thrones, she manufactures them. The Emperor Menelik has ordered a throne, and it is to be built in Paris. The frame will be of solid oak, with gold encrusted ornaments, and draped with silk. In fact, this throne is to be a first class article, and quite as good as anybody else's throne.

Marie Corelli has had her portrait made; the artist being Miss Donald-Smith. One might expect that Marie Corelli would appear as a flashing dream, dressed in black, with gores of crimson, but she does not. The artist has given Marie Corelli the guise of a golden-haired young person, clad in virginal white, walking down a staircase. London reporters say people with a now look at Marie Corelli "for just one shilling." The reason these ungalant young gentlemen had for poking fun at the original of the picture was that the lady had most indignantly declined to have her photograph taken—and yet to the man with the camera, with his exceeding skill, construct a flattering print. Any woman may to-day be made lovely, photographically, for the reflection may become more engaging than the actual figure.

St. Henry Parkes, the Australian statesman, counted Carlyle among the men who had influenced him. But his first meeting with the man of Chelsea did not promise such things. Parkes began life as a foundry lad in Birmingham, went out to Australia, rose to prominence through his own exertions, was self-taught and self-made, and in 1861, when sent to England to lecture in behalf of emigration to New South Wales, bore a letter to Carlyle. Of his first interview with Carlyle he wrote in the following year: "I don't think I understand Carlyle. I have seen him twice, and had a long conversation with him each time, or, more accurately speaking, I listened to long, characteristic utterances from him. He spoke of the Young Ireland party, of O'Connell, of English prisons and prison reformers, of colonization, of Tennyson and Browning, of Peel, Gladstone, Bright and Spurgeon; of Australian democracy, and a hundred other things. He sat on the floor and smoked, and he laughed outright, with a terrible kind of fullheartedness, at his own grand sarcasms. But I confess I could almost as well explain the meaning of thunder and lightning as the meaning of what he said. He was deeply charmed, and am treasuring up an invitation to spend another hour with him."

During the second hour Parkes became a convert, and in his later career as Prime Minister in the Antipodes he fully realized what Carlyle's warnings had done for him. Of his second interview in Cheshyre Row he made this record: "On the second occasion he did me the honor to say he had been thinking over my defense of the Italian democratic institutions, and that he thought I was right, after all. It would never do to let the old fogies of officialdom direct the energies of a young country."

Bacchylides' poems, the papyrus containing which was acquired by the British Museum in 1896, are about to be published. Nearly twice as many lines have been recovered as was supposed at first, the total being about 1,000. There are twenty poems or pieces of poems, in all, six being complete, and nine more substantial fragments being preserved. Fourteen are in honor of victories in the Olympic games, the rest being paeans, dithyrambs or hymns, classes of verse of which there were hitherto no complete specimens.

Toistol has been obliged by the infirmities of his 80 years to give up much of his literary work. Twice in the last year he has had light strokes of apoplexy. He still rides his bicycle, however, and is accompanied on most of his wheeling trips by one of his daughters. He has been highly pleased recently by the work of a young man named Konissi, who is translating "Anna Karenina" and "The Kreutzer Sonata" into Japanese. Konissi is a student at the Kieff Theological School, though a born Japanese.

A book written by a former Judge of the Imperial Court, Herr Otto Mittelstaedt, entitled "Before the Flood," has created a sensation in Berlin. It contains in detail the political development

of Germany under the present Emperor, and uses vigorous language in condemning his majesty's meddling in every sphere of the Government. It also blames the Ministers and the higher classes for their reactionary views and lack of constitutional moderation. The book has started a storm of press criticism, commendatory and adverse.

The grave of Thackeray, in Kensel-green, England, is neglected, and the inscription on the modest stone which marks the resting place of the great novelist and his mother is almost obliterated.

English admirers of Thackeray are now to be treated to cheap editions of "Henry Esmond." The copyright has just expired.
