

OUR GUATEMALAN EXHIBIT.

WHAT COMMISSIONER CARLETON CLARK SAYS OF IT.

California Made a Great Hit, but Her Merchants Fail to Profit Thereby.

Carleton H. Clark, California Commissioner to the Guatemalan Exposition, who returned from the Central American Republic a week ago, was in the city yesterday looking none the worse for his prolonged sojourn in the tropics.

In conversation with a "Record-Union" reporter, however, Commissioner Clark said the climate of the country had served him no better than the hundreds of other foreigners who attended the exposition, and that dysentery, with which he was attacked shortly after his arrival at his post of duty, scarcely left him during his stay.

Commissioner Clark said that California is the only one of the United States which made an exhibit at the exposition, and as it was centrally located in the main building, it was the principal point of interest, and attracted immense crowds throughout the entire season.

The people of Guatemala, the Commissioner said, are thieves, and are very seldom paralleled, and do not hesitate to steal anything from a red-hot stove down. They are also lazy, which characteristic is to be accounted for by the torridity of the climate.

"But," continued Commissioner Clark, "if the people of Guatemala are lazy, and nobody who ever studied them can doubt it, I have come to believe that they are no less slothful than the merchants of California. The trade of Guatemala properly belongs to California, while, as a matter of fact, but a small percentage of it comes this way.

The Commissioner called attention to one branch of merchandise—agricultural implements—and said that Germany furnishes more than 50 per cent, while England has but 25 per cent, and the United States less than 22 per cent.

Other commodities, he said, are furnished about in proportion. It would be comparatively easy for California to corner the great bulk of the Guatemala trade, and once it had set this way, it would be the work of years for any other country, or section of this country, to diverge it, admitting that such a thing were possible.

Leaving out Germany, England and Italy, California will, Mr. Clark said, soon have a rapid competitor in the trade of the Central American Republic in the shape of New York and other Eastern cities, as well as Chicago and other cities in the Mississippi Valley.

A railroad is now in course of construction from the Gulf seaboard to Guatemala City, and when it is finished New York and New Orleans merchants will lose no time in fitting out swift and strong steamers, and will certainly monopolize the Guatemala trade, unless California wakes up with a strong hand and seizes what properly belongs to her.

The railroad in question extends sixty miles inland from the coast, and seventy-five miles remains to be constructed. The recent revolution, he said, has delayed the construction of the road, but President Barrios is an energetic man, and will see that it is pushed to completion at the earliest possible moment.

The exhibit, said Commissioner Clark, has thoroughly advertised California products, and if the merchants take advantage of the favorable impression made they may easily carry off the bulk of trade from the revolutionary republic.
