

HOW HENNESSY WAS SHOT.

THE STORY AS TOLD TO THE CORONER'S JURY.

Verdict That He Died by the Accidental Discharge of a Gun in Eben Owen's Hands.

Coroner Clark held an inquest yesterday on Mat Hennessy, who was shot by Eben Owen on his farm last Friday night. It will be remembered that Owen and his neighbors had been much troubled with petty thieves, who had entered houses and also stolen chickens. On the night in question Owen heard a noise among the chickens and went out, taking his gun. A man who was found in a tree, was shot and Owen found it was one of his hired men, whom he had supposed was in bed. He stated that the shooting was accidental. Bennie Stevens testified that they heard the noise of chickens squawking. Mr. Owen took his gun and went out and the witness followed him. Owen asked who was there and told the man to come down. Witness was about three feet from him. Owen backed away from the tree a few feet and the witness saw him stumble and the gun went off. Witness had stepped over the limb that Owen stumbled over, knowing where it was. He did not know whether the gun was at Owen's shoulder or not, as it was dark and he was looking up in the tree. Hennessy tumbled out of the tree, saying, "oh, oh," and only gasped a couple of times. When the gun went off, Owen said, "I stumbled over the tree." He never heard Owen and Hennessy have any trouble. Hennessy was a good-natured fellow and he never knew him to have any trouble with anyone. Witness never heard him talk of playing a joke on Owen about the chickens. The night witness and Owen went out about the chickens before, the latter fired his gun in the air when the dogs went after the mule. Harry Owen testified that his brother sent for him on Friday night, saying that he had shot Hennessy. He told Eben that he would better come with him and took him to Elk Grove. A few days before Hennessy had told witness about Eben's chasing a mule for a chicken thief and laughed heartily about it. He was a man who was fond of a joke. The statement of the housekeeper, May Coffman, made to the coroner and District Attorney, was read to the jury. She related how she told Owen that something was after the chickens. He went out and came back, saying he guessed there was nothing. They heard the chickens squawk and Owen took his gun and went out. It was some minutes before she heard the shot. She had heard Owen, Eben and Hennessy discuss chicken stealing, but did not remember what Owen said. She had a share in the chickens and they have been disappearing lately. She heard Hennessy laughing at Owen about the mule and shooting his gun off in the air. Dr. F. M. Reith testified that his autopsy showed that the main charge entered the right side of the body, piercing the heart and right lung. Joseph Stevens testified that Owen took his gun and went out when the chickens were heard. He heard the shot and Hennessy's groan and fall. They came to the house for a light. He supposed at the time that Hennessy was upstairs. Witness went out with the lantern and Hennessy gasped a

REGULATION REGARDING THE STATE SHOOTING.

III. From and after this date Colonels of regiments will make arrangements for the reloading of the ammunition for Springfield rifles, to be used in the State contests, N. G. C., and all requisitions for material for reloading said ammunition and all communications relative to the ammunition will be addressed to the Quartermaster, I. R. P., at once place themselves in communication with Colonel Henshaw, I. R. P., to the end that a uniform system of reloading this ammunition shall be inaugurated. IV. (a) Major and Surgeons of the Sanitary Corps who have been assigned to duty with the Colonels commanding regiments, and the Lieutenant and Surgeon of the naval battalion and the Surgeons detailed with the Signal Corps and Cavalry, will be held responsible for all property of the Sanitary Corps with which their respective detail is equipped. All property in their possession or under their control must be reported by them to the Surgeon-General in January and June of each year. (b) All reports and communications of Surgeons will be forwarded through proper channels, to the Surgeon-General for his indorsement. V. The attention of the commanding officers is especially called to Section 2028, Political Code, the provisions of which are constantly being violated, as shown by monthly returns. VI. It appearing from the records in the case of court-martial proceedings of Captain S. P. Blumenberg, retired, that the requirements of paragraphs 804, 805, 357 and 958, Rules and Regulations, N. G. C., and the law in court-martial proceedings were not complied with by general headquarters at the time of publication of general orders No. 3, series of 1895, dated February 12, 1895, in this, that the proceedings were not approved and decision and orders were not signed at the end of the proceedings as specifically provided in said regulations, within the fifteen days' time mentioned in para-
