

A STATE INSTITUTION.

The Yountville Soldiers' Home Will Receive Its Allowance.

Controller Colgan seems to have been right in his contention that the Veterans' Home at Yountville is a State institution, and Governor Budd has qualified his assertion made at a meeting of the State Board of Examiners in this city, that "the home shall have none of the State's money until it shall have complied with the Act of the last Legislature by deeding its property to the State," is evidenced by the fact that on the 6th inst., at a meeting of the Board of Examiners in San Francisco, he affixed his signature to the bill.

At the same meeting, Attorney-General Fitzgerald also approved the bill, and yesterday Controller Colgan drew his warrant on the State Treasurer in favor of the institution for \$11,250, that sum being the first quarter's allowance for the forty-ninth fiscal year, and which was due October 1, 1897.

Something over a year ago, Secretary of State Brown, acting under instructions from the Board of Examiners, investigated the Veterans' Home at Yountville, and reported that it was not a State institution and was therefore not entitled to State aid.

Controller Colgan took issue with the Secretary of State, and both upheld their positions in the columns of the "Record-Union." But a bill was passed by the last Legislature and approved by the Governor, providing for the transfer of the property of the home to the State.

The Directors of the home, however, declined to deed the property to the State, holding that if such a course were taken, there would be no money for the support of the institution until the next meeting of the Legislature, as the last one made no provisions for the new institution.

Accordingly, when the first quarter's bill for the forty-ninth fiscal year was sent in, it was laid over until there should be a full meeting of the Board of Examiners. Governor Budd emphasized the statement that the home would get none of the State's money, and there the matter rested.

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front, and in an interview published in the "Record-Union," again declared the home to be a State institution, and quoted authorities for his contention. The action of the Governor and the Attorney-General, in approving the bill, in reality admitted the justness of the Controller's position, and the Yountville Home is still receiving State support.

Services at the Funeral of the Late Captain J. M. Paulk.

The following communication has been received from a prominent member of the Ladies of the Grand Army in relation to the funeral of the late Captain J. M. Paulk:

Notwithstanding the rain there was a large attendance at the funeral of Captain J. M. Paulk from his late residence, 213 F street, on Thursday. The Grand Army of the Republic and the Ladies of the Grand Army attended in a body, besides hosts of friends to whom the Captain had endeared himself in the past few years. Although he had been confined to the house for over fourteen years from the results of a stroke of paralysis, he still had made a great many warm friends, especially among the G. A. R. organizations. His military career was one of which he and his family had just cause to be proud, he having served over three years in Company K, Thirty-ninth Ohio Volunteers.

The funeral services at the house were conducted by Rev. Banks. The Ladies of the G. A. R. flag service was performed by Mrs. Belle S. Hart, assisted by the members of the Circle. At the cemetery the services were under the auspices of Sumner Post, No. 3, of which he was a member. The salute was fired by members of the National Guard in uniform and taps was sounded by Frank Adams. The choir, consisting of Mesdames Dassonville, Herr, Hillis and Jenks and Messrs. Barkwith and Horrage, with Professor E. W. Little as organist, sang at the house "Asleep in Jesus," "It is Well With My Soul" and "Near My God to Thee." At the grave they sang "Jesus, I Come to Thee," "He's Gone" and "Some Sweet Day." The flower pieces were very beautiful, especially the pieces sent by Sumner Post, No. 3; Edward Roby Circle, No. 2; Sumner Ladies Circle, No. 11, and the teachers of the seventh and eighth schools. The pall-bearers were: General T. W. Sheehan, M. E. Gates and O. P. Dodge from Sumner Post, and L. W. Grothen, George W. Herr and Harvey Moore from Warren Post.
