McKENNA NOMINATION. Senate Judiciary Committee Has Not Reached a Conclusion.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—The Senate Judiciary Committee today had the nomination of Attorney-General McKenna to be Justice of the Supreme Court under consideration for two hours to-day, but adjourned without reaching a conclusion upon it.

It was stated that the failure was due to the general importance of nomination, and general feeling that full time should be given to it by the committee.

The entire time of the committee meeting to-day was consumed in reading communications bearing upon the nomination. There was a great mass of these, some of them urging confirmation and others in opposition. There was a large number of protests against the nomination from branches of the American Protective Association, and also from some members of the bar from the Pacific Coast, besides a miscellaneous lot of letters from other parts of the country.

The charges are general that McKenna had not had the legal training and judicial experience to fit him for the position. There was also a disposition manifested on the part of some to tomahawk him on the ground that he was a member of the Catholic Church. The members of the committee did not enter upon any discussion. None of the Democratic members expressed an opinion during the meeting, and this was favorable to confirmation.

The committee will meet again Thursday, when it is hoped to secure favorable consideration.

WONDERFUL STAIRWAY.

Remarkable Ruins Recently Discovered in Central America. George Byron Gordon, the explorer, in the account of recent excavations at Copan, under the title of "The Mysterious City of Honduras." Mr. Gordon says:

The most extraordinary feature that our excavations have yet brought to light is the hieroglyphic stairway already referred to. Facing the plaza at the southern end, it occupied a central position on the western side of the high pyramidal elevation that forms the northern wing of the main structure.
