

The gold regions of the Klondike are described and pictured elaborately in "Frank Leslie's Popular Monthly" for February (New York). The article is written by Henry Clay Clover of Seattle, who gives an interesting account of the first discoveries and of the recent expeditions, and tells in a practical way just what is necessary to fit a man out for a year. The illustrations are numerous and excellent. Following this article is a paper on "Alaska" by R. H. Herron, which contains a description of our far-away Territory, in which the magical Klondike is situated. This also is richly illustrated. A 16x22-inch map of Alaska accompanies these articles. There are many other attractive features in this number of "Frank Leslie's Popular Monthly." The history and growth of the Methodists in this country forms the subject of an important paper by Ferdinand Cowdighart, which is accompanied by more than forty portraits and views. The fourth paper in the magazine's great series on "Andrew Jackson" treats of "Old Hickory" as statesman and President, as told by A. Oakley Hall and illustrated by numerous portraits, etc. "Life in Norway" is an entertaining and instructive article by Helen Bradford, and Carrie Stowe-Walt writes of the joys of "Wheeling in Picardy" in a prettily written and well-illustrated paper. Very clever farce, entitled "Lost-A Letter," is contributed by Helen Leavenworth Herrick. There are articles on "St. Valentine's Day," "Bear Hunting in Russia," and "The Army of the Potomac," the last a clear, straightforward account of the army's central career, by General Horatio C. King. The short stories and poems are good, and the department for boys and girls is as interesting as usual.

The "Pacific Monthly" is the title of the magazine, the first number appearing in January. It is edited and conducted by Marie Eva Bradford, Pacific Grove and San Francisco. It is championing the cause of woman suffrage, of the W. C. T. U., and generally high moral work. The magazine is 128 pages, neatly printed, and the matter is of a high and interesting character. The short stories and poems are good, and the department for boys and girls is as interesting as usual.

The current issue of the "North American Review" (New York) contains these leading papers, and it will be noticed that about all are of first importance and of living interest.
