

BURIED IN THE POTTER'S FIELD.

EDWARD OHRENSTICH, HEIR TO A LARGE FORTUNE.

Died a Maniac's Death, Said to be the Result of His Wife's Infidelity.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—Edward W. Ohrenstich, heir to one million dollars (\$400,000) in Buda Pest, Hungary, lies in a pauper's grave in the potter's field.

While agents and lawyers were searching the world over for one of the heirs to the millions of Buda Pest's greatest banker, the object of their quest occupied a maniac's cell in the County Asylum.

A letter was received yesterday by Chief of Detectives Collier requesting him to look for Ohrenstich. The letter came from Buda Pest, and said that a fortune awaited Ohrenstich, as his father had died recently.

When young Ohrenstich learned the state of affairs he parted from his wife, and shortly after came to America, arriving in New York City in 1873.

He secured employment with A. H. Hoerner, a New York broker, and came to Chicago as his agent. He soon after called on Waldman, who noticed that Ohrenstich was not in his right mind.

Ohrenstich's peculiar actions attracted considerable attention at the Grand Northern Hotel, where he was stopping, and he was finally arrested and sent to the House of Correction on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Shortly after Ohrenstich was discharged he was again arrested, and this time sent to the detention hospital. On May 20, 1897, he was declared insane, and committed to Dunsmuir. He scarcely could be prevailed upon to eat, and on November 25th he died.

Ohrenstich's father died the day his son was committed to the asylum. Up to the time of his commitment, Ohrenstich is said to have corresponded regularly with his relatives, but his letters suddenly ceased, and all trace of him was lost until recently.

Ohrenstich's father died the owner of the largest bank in Buda Pest, and was worth 15,000,000 florins when he died.

SENATOR LINDSAY

Denounced by Members of the Kentucky Legislature.

LOUISVILLE (Ky.), Jan. 27.—A special to the "Post" from Frankfort, Ky., says:

After a heated debate to-day, the Lower House of the Kentucky Legislature adopted a substantive resolution offered by Representative Nelson of Harding, calling on United States Senator Lindsay to resign, if he cannot support the Democratic platform.

During the debate such words as "party traitor," "treacher to his trust," and "gold bug" were freely used. Representative Desha, a silver Democrat from Harrison County, openly denounced Senator Lindsay as a traitor to his party, and called upon him to return home and face an outraged constituency.

Others who made hot speeches along this line were Representatives Trimble, Nelson, Petty, Orr and Hickman. The resolution was adopted by a viva voce vote.

On motion of Representative Pulliam, it was declared in order that the original resolution, introduced by Representative Saunders of Union, be passed. The Senate resolution was then passed by a vote of 55 to 35.

GIRAFFES ARE SCARCE.

WHERE THEY LIVE AND HOW THEY ARE CAPTURED.

Few Giraffes Are Taken Alive as Compared With Other Quadrupeds.

The untimely and most regrettable death of the young, South African giraffe which lately reached England serves again to remind us of the increasing scarcity of these animals and of the immense difficulties which attend their capture.

USES OF ITS HIDE. Giraffe hide—which in the mature animals attains a thickness of at least an inch upon the upper parts—is a commodity eagerly sought after by all natives south and north of the Equator.

CHASE OF THE GIRAFFE. With the horse the chase of the giraffe is rendered comparatively easy, as even a native hunter with a single arrow and a spear can follow and kill the animal.

SPEED IN THE CHASE. The pace of the giraffe is, from its inordinate length of legs, wonderfully deceptive. Viewed from the rear, the trot of these animals in their quieter paces appear to be going very slowly.

THEIR DISTRIBUTION. At the beginning of this century giraffes were to be found inhabiting Africa from the borders of Abyssinia down to the Orange River, south of which it seems doubtful whether their range ever extended.

Now that the Transvaal hunting Boers—finding it more profitable occupation—have turned their attention to the capture instead of the slaughter of the wild animals in the countries beyond their borders, it is possible that we may occasionally hear of young specimens for sale.


