

SACRAMENTAN'S INVENTION

THREE-OUNCE ELECTRIC STORAGE BATTERY.

In Case of Accident It Will Operate Fifty Lights for Ten Hours.

Sacramento has a prospective Edison or Tesla in the person of a modest young man named Emil Kunz, an employe in Schad's restaurant on K street, near Third.

Mr. Kunz has just returned from a six months' visit in the East, whither he went to introduce an invention of his in the shape of an electric storage battery.

He obtained his patent and sold it to a Chicago electric supplies company for \$15,000.

Like many other inventions that are great money-savers, this Mr. Kunz's is quite simple, and yet all the great electricians have overlooked it.

Mr. Kunz's invention is described as a small affair that weighs but three ounces. Its purpose is to receive and store sufficient electricity to operate fifty lights for ten hours.

It stands charged to that extent at all times. In an accident of any kind happens at the power-house by which the machinery is stopped and the power shut off, instantly the little three-ounce attachment in a building where electric lights are in use opens up automatically, and continues to dole out its supply of the electric fluid to the extent, as stated, of supplying fifty lights for ten hours.

Once the electricity is turned on again the little battery goes back to its duty as a receiver of electricity and is soon charged again and in readiness for the next emergency.

Mr. Kunz says he has only disposed of the right to the three-ounce instrument, but that the same principle can be applied on a larger scale. If the invention does what is claimed for it, it will be a great thing for use of electricity.
