SUPERVISORS STRIKE BACK.

SOME GENTLE REMARKS MADE BY MORRISON.

Auditor and District Attorney Roasted-The Former Loses Two Extra Clerks.

The first hour's session of the Board of Supervisors yesterday was dull, but something dropped shortly after 11 o'clock, and for some fifteen or twenty minutes there were about as animated as one could wish for.

It happened about in this way: Chairman Morrison asked Mr. Jenkins to please take the chair for a moment, as he had some remarks to make before the board.

"Last night," said the gentleman from the Third District, "I got to thinking matters over, and I came to the conclusion that there are some ways in which we can probably economize to some extent. There is a clause in the Constitution which declares that the salary or compensation of an official shall not be increased during the term for which he was elected, but I find there is a certain county official who has an extra clerk in his office drawing \$75 a month over the regular sum provided for his office."

Mr. Morrison then went on to explain that he referred to the District Attorney's office. He said he desired to investigate the matter a little further and it was quite likely he would ask the board to employ a lawyer to bring suit for the recovery into the treasury of the money that had been paid out as salary to this extra clerk.

Pursuing the subject, Mr. Morrison said a saving might be made by dispensing with the services of the County Detective appointed to assist the District Attorney as an adjunct to his office. This officer cost the county \$100 a month, and the incidental expenses amount to much more.

Believing that the interests of the county would be subserved thereby, and acting on the suggestion of Grand Jurors, the board had recently employed an accountant to expert all demands filed against the county before their presentation to the board, in order that any over-charges or duplications might be detected and money saved to the county that would be lost by mistakes.

The County Auditor had taken it on himself to refuse to draw the expert's warrant for his first month's salary, by the advice of the District Attorney, but he (Morrison) was not aware that the Auditor had found it necessary to consult the District Attorney regarding the salaries of the two extra clerks recently allowed him for special duties, nor to refuse to issue them warrants for their salaries.

Mr. Morrison said that, speaking for himself, he had always acted fairly and liberally with the various officials—and so had the board when they asked for extra clerical assistance to aid them in discharging unusual duties required of them, and he could not understand why it was that certain of these officials should take advantage of the first opportunity to interfere with the board when it found it necessary to employ a little clerical assistance that was in the interest of economy.

Some months ago, said Mr. Morrison, the County Assessor, in the discharge of his duties, came into conflict with a property owner who was trying to avoid the payment of his taxes, and the board had employed counsel to defend an action brought against the Assessor for alleged damages. The Auditor and District Attorney, however, had refused to permit the payment of counsel fees in that case.

"I now move," said Mr. Morrison, "that the action of the board in allowing the Auditor to employ two extra clerks in his office, for writing up certain records, be rescinded."

Supervisor McCaughin seconded the motion. Supervisor McLaughlin arose and remarked that he believed the law allowed the Auditor the extra clerks.

The roll was called, and all the members voted aye, except McLaughlin, who voted no. Mr. Morrison then gave notice that during the present session of the board he would move to disperse with the services of the county detective and for the employment of counsel to bring suit to recover the \$75 per month that had been paid out for a clerk in the District Attorney's office in addition to the regular Assistant District Attorney.
