MUCH YET UNPAID. President Morrison of the Board of Supervisors is not in the city, and Mr. Jenkins was yesterday at his home near Elk Grove. Supervisor Curtis was communicated with by telephone and asked what he knew about the matter.

Reflects on Two Supervisors—What a Dredger Owner Has to Say. The San Francisco "Call" yesterday published quite a sensational story...

Something over a year ago the Board of Supervisors acceded to a proposition made by land-owners on Sutter Island to have the county pay one-half the cost of raising the levee, which was thereafter to constitute a public road...

WHAT SUPERVISOR DREMAN SAYS. A "Record-Union" reporter called on Supervisor Dreman and inquired whether or not McGrath had drawn the money due the dredging company for building the levee in question.

Mr. Dreman said he had nearly forgotten the circumstances connected with the case, but remembered that somebody had drawn about \$1,400 for the dredging company, though whether or not it was McGrath he could not say.

Continuing, Mr. Dreman said the reason the rest of the money due had not been paid was because there were no funds on hand with which to pay it. He felt satisfied that Supervisor Morrison had had nothing whatever to do with the matter, other than voting to allow the bill, and that as the levee and road had been built in Supervisor Jenkins' district he would probably know more about it than anybody else.

ATTORNEY GETT'S DENIAL. Attorney W. A. Gett was seen at his home. He said that when the residents of the reclamation district had appeared before the Board of Supervisors and asked assistance in constructing two levees, which when built should also be used as roads, he had acted as their attorney, and had presented the matter before the board.

Mr. Gett said the board finally agreed to pay one-half the cost of construction, provided it did not exceed \$5,000. He was not inclined to view the matter seriously. He said he had given his services to the petitioners gratuitously, as he was acting as attorney for the district, and had never received one cent of money from W. G. Witter, P. H. McGrath, nor anybody else, and had not the least idea what had been done with the \$1,440.

After the dredging company had been at work a month, Mr. Gett said, County Surveyor Boyd had viewed and measured the work done by them and recommended that their bill of \$2,880 be paid. Mr. Elliott, President of the Reclamation District, paid one-half of the amount, and he (Gett) had gone with him to the bank and had the check cashed.

McGrath, Mr. Gett explained, while not exactly appointed as the agent of the board of supervisors, was designated by that body to superintend the work, as he was a landowner in the district. He did not believe, he said, that McGrath was criminal, and the admission by Witter that he had accepted \$1,000 and had given a receipt in full, definitely settled the matter.

Mr. Gett said the reason the receipt of the money for constructing the levee had never been paid by the Board of Supervisors, was because the road had not been graded down as per agreement.

Mr. Gett was inclined to believe that the whole matter was merely a question of dollars and cents between McGrath and Witter. He thought it possible, though he did not presume to know, that an agreement might have been entered into between them whereby McGrath was to be paid for his services as Superintendent. The dredging company had been legally called to collect their bill, and it looked as if Witter was trying to browbeat somebody to get his money.

STOLEN JEWELRY. George Luxon Charged With Robbing His Sister. The statement was published yesterday that the police were looking for George Luxon, for whose arrest a warrant had been issued charging him with embezzlement.

Whoever caused the announcement to be made deserves the everlasting gratitude of Mr. Luxon, for the chances are that his friends will "put him on" and thus give him a chance to get away to Alaska or some other place where he will not be disturbed.

Luxon is charged with having taken some jewelry belonging to his sister, Mrs. C. H. Davis—a watch and chain, bracelet, diamond pin and pair of diamond earrings. He sold the articles to the Gomansky Bros, who in turn had disposed of some of them before the theft was reported.

The remaining articles were found exposed for sale in Zemansky's show windows, but was sold outright by Luxon, who was supposed to have been the owner.

POLICE COURT'S STATUS.

It Will be Determined by the Supreme Court This Week. The Supreme Court will on Wednesday of this week hear the habeas corpus case of Andrew Sparks, who seeks his release from the County Jail here under the decision of Superior Judge Hart declaring the late lamented Police Court to have been an illegal tribunal.

Sparks of course received his passport to the County Jail from the Police Court. S. R. Hart is the petitioner's attorney.

Since the decision of Judge Hart several other Judges have knocked out of Police Courts in their counties, and the action of the Supreme Court in the Sparks case is looked for with more than ordinary interest, for if these courts should be declared to have been illegally organized several County Jails will be almost depopulated.

PERCENTAGE GAME.

Seven Japs Detected in Conducting Illegal Poker. Officers Douglas and Fisher yesterday raided a poker game in the Japanese quarters in the alley between Third and Fourth, L and M streets, and arrested S. Kinamoto, who was dealing the game, and K. Kamto, S. Marto, K. Macto, T. Nosagoe, T. Murto, T. Meyamat and T. Iedo, who were playing.

All the paraphernalia of the game, including checks, money, cards and the several hands dealt out, were confiscated, and will be used as evidence in prosecuting the case. Officer Douglas noticed that the take-down consisted of two checks for every pair, and says there can be no doubt about the game being run on percentage.

New Pumping Plant for the Blue Ravine Mine. The Folsom "Telegraph" says that extensive preparations for working the Blue Ravine mine, situated at Mormon Island, are being made.
