This explains how the body came to be placed in the cemetery, regardless of the request in the will. The explanation for the neglect of his grave probably lies in the fact that about that time the Governor of the old Dominion had his hands full with the worries of the Civil War...

John Tyler, according to popular belief during his life, and probably in truth, was a lineal descendant of Wat Tyler, the famous Englishman who rebelled against the tyranny of King James I.

When the rebellion was threatening, the former President was unanimously declared a member of the Peace Conference which met in Henry's Hall, Washington, February 4, 1861.
