WORK FOR WILLING HANDS. Los Angeles Herald: The continued industrial depression throughout the country has given a new impetus to enterprises having for their chief aim the removal of workmen and their families from the congested labor centers to various localities where the presence of native resources invites emigrants willing to work out destiny in their development. The apparent collapse of Mr. Debs' scheme for transplanting to some one of the Western States a large colony, heralded a year ago under the alluring title of "Social Democracy," has not discouraged other less pretentious enterprises, along lines not so involved with menacing elements. On the contrary, some of these have been organized and have taken tangible shape, while Mr. Debs has been exploiting his idealized movement on the stump and in the newspapers.

SUGAR BEETS AND COLUSA. Colusa Sun: Sugar beets are to be planted in quantities sufficient to make a good test, at least, in the vicinity of Colusa. We are satisfied that this district of country is well adapted to the growth of the beet and that it is to be the future industry here. We have worked hard to get it started. When the discussion of a factory here was commenced we urged it on all the available capitalists, and got some to come up and see the country. Every man (who had a knowledge of the business) to whom we showed the country or to whom we described it was satisfied that it would be first-class for beets. Then as soon as we found that a factory was to be established at Crockett in the hands of the agers and got them interested in the country and finally to agree to take beets from a point as high up the river as Colusa provided we could get enough to justify preparing for the shipment. This company controls the bulk of the island sugar, which it will refine at Crockett, and it expects to have other factories tributary to this one for the purpose of making refined sugar, and we believe, and they believe, that Colusa is their place. The Colusa committee has done good work.

ANOTHER EXAMPLE. Willows Promoter: Another nice loss to the Government which is directly attributable to yellow journalism, is about to be consummated. For months the papers were full of harrowing stories of the great suffering which was sure to overtake the Klondikers, from scarcity of food, all written in San Francisco but purporting to come from special correspondents in the Yukon. The Government was asked to relieve the distress and it cheerfully went about the work. Now the War Department has decided to abandon the proposed expedition for the relief of the Klondike miners, the conclusion being reached that there is no necessity for it. Secretary Alger has introduced in Congress, authorizing the disposing of the supplies and the reindeer purchased for the expedition.
