LAST EVENING'S LECTURE BY BURCHAM HARDING.

The Doctrine of Helping and Sharing—"Brotherhood the Highest Religion."

Last evening, at Pythian Castle, Burcham Harding of New York gave a stirring address on "Brotherhood," this evening on Tuesday further addresses will be delivered by Mr. Harding at the same place.
