

AN INTERESTING LECTURE.

BURCHAM HARDING ON UNIVERSAL BROTHERHOOD.

A Revival of the Doctrines Taught in Past Ages and Symbolized in Many Places.

A lecture of keen interest and most pleasing surprise was given at Pythian Castle last evening by Burcham Harding, lecturer for "Universal Brotherhood."

In June, 1896, a band of Americans, headed by Mrs. Katherine A. Tingley of New York, started on a "Brotherhood" crusade around the world. They traveled 40,000 miles, visited the chief countries, and planted centers for the work in every place.

Said the lecturer: "Brotherhood is natural to man; he is innately led to be kind and helpful to his fellows; only for the purpose of gain is he unbrotherly and cruel. In olden times there were certain centers in the world in which brotherhood was practiced. These places were visited by the crusaders, and the old fires which had been slumbering for centuries were fanned to life and activity. As a seed germinates unseen below the surface preparatory to its appearance above ground, so have the crusaders sown seeds around the world, which will in course of time spring up and bear fruit."

The lecture was illustrated by a hundred stereoscopic views, illustrative of brotherhood, bringing out clearly that formerly a great truth, identical in all respects, was spread around the world. This great truth referred to the union of man, and the spiritual nature of the unseen world. The same symbols representing this truth are found everywhere, engraved on stone, and also held in memory in the workings of secret societies and in religions. These records were visible in the ruins of the Druid remains; in Germany, Greece, Egypt, India, Australia, Samoa, and also in Central America. This great truth was once well known; there was a free-masonry which kept it alive and handed it on from generation to generation, and its memory is retained to-day among many mystic orders, whose first object is brotherhood.

The views also made prominent several workers for brotherhood during the past centuries. The lecture took the audience far out of the beaten path, and away from the usual hackneyed narrative of travel, for it was interlined with little touches about the grand work which is being inaugurated by "Universal Brotherhood" for the betterment of the whole world.

The first views were of Scotland and Holywood Palace, in which Mary Queen of Scots was kept prisoner. From there the Crusaders visited Ireland and examined the oldest Druid monuments in existence, one of which was put up 2,300 years ago. In this monument were signs and other data found, on this day on the walls in the old temples of India and other countries where the mysteries of life were taught. Some magnificent pictures of the Lakes of Killarney and vicinity were shown.

The next place visited was Paris, and among the pictures shown was that of Joan of Arc, which is in the Louvre.

The next pictures were places in Amsterdam. From there the Crusaders visited Berlin and Heidelberg and Switzerland. The lecturer showed some magnificent pictures of Italy. The ruins of ancient Rome are remarkable for the likeness of the scenes of to-day. The Crusaders passed from Italy to Greece, visiting the ancient temples of the countries through which they traveled. The Egyptian sphinx and monuments were visible, and pictures taken of such interiors as could be procured. The Indian cave temples were of the most interest to the searchers after ancient religious lore. In them were found remarkable works bearing upon the ancient mystical lore given to the world by the ancient sages. Life work was the study of the mysteries of life.

Ceylon and Australasia were next visited, and the explorers were somewhat amazed to find a native chief in Samoa as well versed in many secrets of the American societies as were the members themselves. The lecture was intensely interesting throughout, and Mr. Harding gave some very vivid descriptions of some of the events which occurred in places of which pictures were shown.

While at Killarney the Crusaders selected a stone which has been used as a foundation stone for the "School for the Revival of the Lost Mysteries of Antiquity," which was laid at Point Loma, near San Diego, by the Crusaders upon their return to this country. In this school the old mysteries respecting the spiritual nature of man and the world will be once more taught. For nearly 2,000 years these truths

have been lost to the outer world, and only their memory retained in symbolic form.

TWO OF A KIND. They Both Wanted New Coats to Keep Off the Rain.

Shortly after 7 o'clock last evening a stranger attempted to steal a coat from the store of Albert Ekus, on J street, near Tenth, but was detected and placed under arrest. At the Police Station he refused to give his name and pretended to be greatly under the influence of liquor. He was conducted into the hobo cell and locked up for investigation.

Later in the evening one of the clerks in Marks' clothing store, on K street, caught a man attempting to steal a coat from one of the dummy figures in front of the store, and he promptly grabbed him. The fellow showed fight and for a time made things exceedingly interesting for all hands. When the patrol wagon arrived, he was taken to the station, where he again showed fight, but was promptly overpowered and strapped down.

He refused to give any name, but claimed to be a subject of the Queen's, and demanded the presence of the English Consul, saying that he would see that his Government would make it very hot for the United States because of this outrage on his personality. He also expressed considerable contempt for the fighting abilities of Americans in general, and Michael Angelo Fisher in particular, who he promised to pulverize if the straps were only removed.

MRS. MCGUIRE'S FUNERAL. It Was Largely Attended Yesterday at the Cathedral.

The funeral of Mrs. Bridget McGuire took place from the Cathedral yesterday afternoon and was very largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. Father Brady, and the interment was in the family plot in St. Joseph's cemetery.

The deceased had resided in this city for upward of thirty years and possessed a host of friends and acquaintances. The floral offerings were numerous and costly, and a large following attended at her last resting place. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. Cotter, McGrath, Royal, Judge, Buckley and Divinsky.

IT WAS FAIRCHILD. He Was Killed by Accident on the Ferryboat Solano.

The Coroner of Contra Costa County has ascertained that the man who was killed on the ferry boat Solano on March 29th was Ephraim Fairchild, and that he formerly lived in this city, and owned property here.

It will be remembered that he was arrested in this city some time ago on suspicion that he was insane, and was afterwards sent out to the County Hospital.
