

BAD BOYS HAD BEST BEWARE.

JUSTICE DAVIS WILL PUNISH THEM IF THEY DO NOT.

A Gang Who Annoyed the Residents of the Northeast Part of the City.

Six boys, named Wilson, Ward, Rippon, Lohman, Stevens and Hildebrand, were arraigned yesterday in the City Justice's Court for disturbing the peace.

Mrs. L. C. Hitchcock, who lives at 615 Fifth street and who swore out the complaint against them, testified that for the past two years she has been annoyed by a gang of boys who congregated on the sidewalk under her windows to smoke and play cards, and that they used bad language.

Two other ladies testified to the same effect, Mrs. Williams saying that the gang had been so annoying that she had had several times been broken on former occasions. She asked that many and told the names of a number of them, but they would not go away until she threatened to telephone to the police station.

Justice Davis said there was no doubt that the ladies had given a correct version of the affair. It is singular that none of the boys saw any cards played. He wanted to catch the other members of the gang, and he hoped the ladies would be able to do so. He wished to catch all the boys who misbehave so. He could send them to jail for three months and fine them \$200 besides, but he hated to send them to jail. He thought the parents were to blame sometimes, as they do not exercise sufficient authority over them.

He did not object to bail when properly played, but they should not break people's windows. They were allowed to stay out too late nights. It is a bad thing, and he wished he could have the curfew ring again and the law enforced. It would save a great many boys who now become bad.

He cautioned Rippon not to be brought before him again. If he was, he would send him to jail. He would suspend sentence in all but one case, if they and their parents would promise that they would behave.

The boys and their mothers all promised, and were allowed to go. He then scored Wilson severely, saying that he had heard of him a number of times before, and there was no doubt he had abused his mother. He would therefore sentence him to twenty days in the County Jail.
