

THE CLOUD GROWS DARKER.

(Continued from First Page.)

To-day being Holy Thursday, all traffic is suspended. The streets are crowded with ladies, many wearing the national colors in their hair, going from one church to another. The spectators are so numerous in the principal streets that all have to proceed at the very slowest walk.

While the crowd was thickest, General Woodford, the United States Minister, and Miss Woodford walked from the United States Legation to their residence. They were recognized by many, but their promenade was not marked by any special incident.

POPE'S INTERVENTION CAME TOO LATE.

BERLIN, April 7.—The Madrid correspondent of the "Cologne Gazette" says:

The papers of the American Consulate have already been entrusted to the care of the British Ambassador. At midnight the Pope made fresh confidential representations to the Spanish Government, and a second Cabinet council was then held. But the reply was to the effect that the Pope's intervention had come too late, as a decision had already been arrived at.

MORE SPANISH WARSHIPS TO SAIL IMMEDIATELY.

MADRID, April 7.—(Via Paris)—Fifteen Spanish men-of-war will leave Cadix immediately for Cape Verde Islands, and several battalions have started to reinforce the garrison at the Azores Islands in the Mediterranean. The provincial militia in the Canary Islands will be placed on a war footing. Lieutenant-General Correa, the Minister of War, and Admiral Bermejo, the Minister of Marine, are actively at work in their departments, despite the holiday.

MINISTER WOODFORD Will Remain at His Post Until Directed to Apply for Passports.

MADRID, April 7, noon.—The guards around the United States Legation were trebled to-day. General Woodford was at his desk at an early hour and many Americans called to ask about arrangements made for their protection. The General said he would remain here until directed to apply for his passports or until they are handed to him.

The family of General Woodford, which left this city last night, has arrived at Hendrix on the frontier, and proceeded to Biarritz.

In spite of the alarming situation and the general belief that the conflict is about reached, several of the diplomats still hope for peace.

The city thus far is perfectly quiet. 5:30 p. m.—United States Minister Woodford has issued the following statement to the Spanish press:

"The Madrid newspapers of this morning are filled with statements concerning the American Minister which are so inaccurate that he asks the courtesy of the press to correct them. He does this in the interest of friendship and peace.

"The properties of his diplomatic position forbid his making any statement with regard to his diplomatic action with the Spanish Government. But last September the Spanish Foreign Office issued a written permission to publish the text of any official correspondence which he should have at any time with the Spanish Government, and this permission is effective to-day. The Spanish Government is at complete liberty to publish every word he has addressed to the Foreign Office by letter, memorandum or statement.

"The Second Secretary of the American Legation has sailed for New York to resume the practice of his profession. He has resigned from the diplomatic service. The American Minister's wife left with her niece for France Tuesday night. She is in poor health, and the excitement of the last fortnight has compelled her to seek rest. The daughter of the Minister remains with him at Madrid. He has not given up his residence, where he expects to reside so long as he shall remain accredited to the Spanish court.

"The American Minister has received nothing but courtesy from the people of Madrid. He has never had the slightest apprehension as to his personal safety, or that of his family. He is working for peace, and despite all rumors to the contrary, he still hopes peace will be kept between Spain and the United States, and that peace will soon be re-established in Cuba, based upon absolute justice, with protection for the great American interests in that island and the maintenance of the honor of Spain."

FOREIGN POWERS FOR PEACE.

A Note to McKinley From Six Leading Countries.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The representatives of the six great Powers of Europe, Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia, Austria and Italy, gave official form at noon to-day of their recent conferences in the interest of a peaceful settlement of the Cuban situation. Their procedure was unique in the United States, as these powers are familiar in European courts. They called in a body at the White House, presented an address to President McKinley in the blue parlor, received the reply and then proceeded to the State apartment, where, with solemn punctiliousness, they were given the English translation which Sir Julian Pauncefote read. The President's answer was not reduced to French.

An inquiry at the several Embassies and Legations shows that the reply of President McKinley has created a most favorable impression among the Embassadors and Ministers. It was called immediately to London and Paris, and all other European capitals. The declaration of the President that in the interest of humanity this warfare must stop, and his indirect appeal to them to exert their influence in the name of humanity, found a sympathetic reflection in the sentiments of all the Embassadors and other representatives.

THE MESSAGE TO CONGRESS.

President McKinley Says He Regards It as a Closed Document.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Save for the arrival of distinguished public men who tonight conference with the President, there was little outward evidence at the White House to-day of a grave crisis.

At 10 o'clock the President's conferences with the leaders began. Senator Cullom of Illinois, who brought some friends to present to the President, and Representative Grosvenor of Ohio and Cannon of Illinois, the latter Chairman

Embassador, Count Cassini, acting for Russia.

The diplomatic officials congregated at the British Embassy shortly before noon, and then proceeded with their Secretaries to the White House and State Department. The party was made up of the following: The British Embassador, Sir Julian Pauncefote, Dean of the diplomatic corps; the French Embassador, M. Cambon, and M. Thiebaud, First Secretary of the embassy; the German Embassador, Dr. von Holleben, with Baron Spruck von Steinburg, First Secretary of the embassy; the Austrian Minister, Hegen Mueller; the Italian Charge d'Affaires, Count Vinci, and the Russian Charge d'Affaires, Mr. De Wollant.

Arriving at the White House, they were ushered into the blue room, and there received by President McKinley. After a social exchange and mutual well wishes, the Embassadors, Ministers and Charges, speaking through Sir Julian Pauncefote, delivered to the President an address, to which he responded.

Sir Julian Pauncefote, as representative of the Powers, in presenting the note, said:

"Mr. President: We have been commanded by the great Powers of Europe whom we represent here to-day to approach your excellency with a message of friendship and peace at the present critical juncture in the relations between the United States and Spain, and to convey to you the sentiments expressed in the collective note, which I have the honor to place in your hands."

NOTE OF THE POWERS.

The note reads as follows:

"The undersigned, representatives of Germany, Austria-Hungary, France, Great Britain, Italy and Russia, duly authorized in that behalf, address, in the name of their respective Governments, a pressing appeal to feelings of humanity and moderation of the President and of the American people in their existing differences with Spain. They earnestly hope that further negotiations will lead to an agreement, which, while securing the maintenance of peace, will afford all necessary guarantees for the re-establishment of order in Cuba.

"The Powers do not doubt that the humanitarian and purely disinterested character of the representation will be fully recognized and appreciated by the American nation."

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY'S REPLY.

President McKinley replied as follows:

"The Government of the United States recognizes the good will which has prompted the communication of the representatives of Germany, Austria-Hungary, France, Great Britain, Italy and Russia, as set forth in the address of your excellencies, and shares the hope therein expressed that the outcome of the situation in Cuba may be the maintenance of peace between the United States and Spain, affording the necessary guarantees for the re-establishment of order in the island, so terminating the chronic condition of disturbance there which so deeply injures the interests and menaces the tranquility of the American nation by the character and consequences of the struggle thus kept up at our doors, besides shocking its sentiment of humanity."

"The Government of the United States appreciates the humanitarian and disinterested character of the communication now made on behalf of the Powers named, and for its part is confident that equal appreciation will be shown for its own earnest and unselfish endeavors to fulfill a duty to humanity by ending a situation the indefinite prolongation of which has become insufferable."

CONFERENCE AT THE STATE DEPARTMENT.

The party then withdrew to the State Department and repaired in a body to the diplomatic room, where they held a conference with Judge Day, Assistant Secretary of State, Secretary Sherman having gone home to lunch before their arrival.

The conference took a wider range, and went considerably outside of the address to the President. While the diplomats were at first received together, they soon separated into groups, with the apparent purpose of presenting the views of their several Governments to the President.

The German Embassador, the Austrian Minister and the Italian Charge d'Affaires were the first to retire, coming away together. The Russian Charge d'Affaires was the next to leave.

The German Embassador and his Secretary then had a private conference with Judge Day. At its conclusion the French Embassador and his Secretary in turn had a conference with Judge Day. These conferences lasted for about half an hour, the several diplomats leaving separately. Shortly afterward Judge Day left the State Department, declining to say more than to refer inquiries to the Embassadors and the reply of the President.

THE REPLY FAVORABLY RECEIVED.

The action of the powers in presenting the joint note to President McKinley was to have occurred yesterday, but was deferred by delay at St. Petersburg. It was not until 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon that the Russian Government cabled its Charge d'Affaires instructions similar to those already given to the other representatives.

At 7 o'clock last night a conference was held, and the note formally signed, it having been prepared at the meeting at the British Embassy the night before. The note is in French, and bears the signatures of the representatives of the six powers. The original note in French was presented, and Sir Julian Pauncefote stated to the President that it was given to him in this language with the signatures, as French is the diplomatic language of the world. An English translation not bearing the signatures accompanied the original note, and it was this English translation which Sir Julian Pauncefote read. The President's answer was not reduced to French.
