

THE TROPHY TO STAY HERE.

WON BY THE C. C. W. FOR A THIRD TIME.

Yesterday's 100-Mile Relay Race—Sacramento First by 7 Minutes and 20 Seconds.

The relay cycle race between Sacramento and Stockton clubs yesterday, which was won by Sacramento in five hours and twenty minutes, created the greatest interest.

The riders of the relays were announced in the "Record-Union" Saturday, and were not varied from. It was not found possible yesterday.

From 10:30 to 11 o'clock K street was swarming with patrol judges bearing red flags, going to their stations to guard crossings and corners and indicate the way for a distance of four miles out, and to signal the approach of the riders.

The first news gave the Capital City satisfaction, as it showed the men lunched eight miles out, with no decided advantage for any one.

Exact relay time could not be ascertained last night, as the judges and timers scattered on their return to town. These notes, however, indicate the speed at various points.

The arrival at Stockton was in this order: C. C. W. 1:28:30, Terminals, 1:33, Road Club 1:35 p. m.

THE LATE LEVI RACKLIFF.

HIS REMAINS LAID TO REST YESTERDAY.

Impressive Services Held at the Capitol—Resolutions of Respect.

The funeral services of the late State Treasurer Levi Rackliffe were held in the Assembly Chamber in the State Capitol building yesterday afternoon, and the large chamber was taxed to its utmost capacity to accommodate the large number of persons who gathered to pay their tribute to the departed.

The remains lay in state from 10:30 o'clock a. m. until the hour set for the funeral, which was in charge of the Masonic fraternity. Delegations from the several Masonic lodges, the Ancient Order of United Workmen and the Grand Army of the Republic marched into the chamber and subsequently followed the remains to the grave.

The services at the Assembly Chamber were simple, though impressive. They were conducted by Rev. S. J. Carroll, pastor of the Sixth-street Methodist Church, who delivered a brief, impressive address.

The ladies of the G. A. R., led by Mrs. George W. Herr, next performed the ceremonies of that order, and the line of march to the cemetery was taken up, led by the Second Infantry Band, which played a dirge along the route.

At the grave the impressive Masonic service was read by Worshipful Master George W. Herr, of Union Lodge, No. 58. The singing, both in the Assembly Chamber and at the cemetery, was by a male quartet, composed of Messrs. Cohn, Kidder, Genshies and Crocker.

The floral pieces were many and appropriate, some being of great size and all of unexcelled beauty. That sent by the employees of the State Treasurer's office were an ivy pillar, encircled by a wreath and surmounted by a dove—emblem of peace.

A firing party from the local guardsmen, commanded by Corporal Kibel, fired a salute to the memory of the Masonic services were concluded, and the deceased was left alone to his last, long sleep.

IN MEMORIAM. The committee appointed by the officers and attaches of the various State departments to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of the deceased Treasurer, have reported the following:

"Whereas, An all-wise and omnipotent Providence has, in His infinite wisdom, seen fit to remove from our midst our friend and associate in the State's service, Levi Rackliffe, late Treasurer of the State of California; therefore be it

"Resolved, By the State officers and attaches of the State Capitol, that we shall ever cherish the memory of his sterling worth, his unswerving integrity, his unvarying kindly and courteous disposition; and while we shall ever feel that, in his untimely death, we have sustained an irreparable loss, yet we humbly bow to the will of God and commend his spirit to the merciful care of the Great Comforter, who only can bestow that peace which the world can neither give nor take away."

"Resolved, That we extend to his widow and children our sincere sympathy in the great affliction which has fallen upon them.

"Resolved, That these resolutions be engrossed and presented to the family of the deceased, and that a copy of the same be furnished the press for publication." (Signed), E. S. 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
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
