

GHASTLY FIND IN A GARRET.

THE BADLY DECOMPOSED BODY OF H. SCHOENBERGER.

Had Been Missing Several Days—Family Trouble Led to Suicide.

The body of Henry Schoenberger was yesterday found, badly decayed, in the attic of the house occupied by him at Sixth and E streets. He had been dead for several days, and it was plain that he had died by his own hand.

Schoenberger had lately been living alone in the house, his wife and children having found it necessary to leave him because of his harsh treatment of them. For ten or twelve days past he had not been seen about the premises, and the neighbors began to suspect that something was wrong.

Yesterday it was determined to enter the house and ascertain whether or not Schoenberger had committed suicide. The doors were all locked, but entrance was easily effected. The moment the men got into the house they encountered a strong stench, and, following it up, they found Schoenberger's decaying body lying on the floor of the attic. His legs were doubled under him, and there was a rope about his neck. Another piece was attached to a rafter.

The situation of the body, the broken rope, etc., went to show that he had hanged himself, and that subsequent to his death the rope had parted and let the body fall to the floor. An overturned chair near by indicated how the hanging had been effected.

To family dissensions and over-indulgence in liquor is the act of suicide attributed. About a year ago Mrs. Schoenberger threatened to sue for a divorce because of her husband's ugliness, but he refused to do so if he would go to Germany for a visit, and he did so, taking some \$800 with him. The property was all put in her name.

Schoenberger returned last September, and for a few weeks he behaved smoothly, and his affairs went along as usual. Then he fell into his old habits and began abusing his wife. He talked of the Stefan Bauman wife murder and suicide, and said that when he went he would take some of them with him. He conceived a grudge against his older boy because he took his mother's part.

Early on the evening of December 7th last Schoenberger caused a sensation in the neighborhood by firing two shots from a pistol while sitting at a table in the family dining-room with his wife. One, it was thought, was aimed at his wife and the other for his son, but neither took effect. That evening Schoenberger demanded that the younger children be put to bed at 6 o'clock. His wife did not then realize what his intentions were, but after she had ordered the children to bed, she jumped to her feet and also ran from the house, followed by the children.

Schoenberger was locked up for a few days, but he and his wife patched up their quarrel, and he was released. Matters soon resumed their former status, however, and Mrs. Schoenberger left the house with her children. She is in San Francisco, but the children are still in the city.
