

MANY ODD FELLOWS IN LINE.

THEIR CELEBRATION A GREAT SUCCESS.

Excellent Street Pageant—Oration by Hon. M. M. Estee, and Other Exercises.

The Odd Fellows' celebration last evening was on a larger scale than any witnessed here outside of the Fourth of July. Long before the hour at which the procession was announced to start the streets along the line of march were crowded with people of both sexes and all ages, anxious to see the well-dressed cantons and the Stockton Ladies' Drill Corps in their handsome uniforms.

The street parade was of a spectacular nature, and was all that was expected of it, and more. The parade was formed at Ninth and K streets, also started at 7:30 p. m. The line of march was down K street to Third, on Third to J, up J to Tenth, on Tenth to L, out L to Fifteenth, and on Fifteenth to the new Pavilion, where the exercises of the evening were held.

First in the line marched twenty local policemen, marshaled by Chief Sawyer, and the members of the law presented a natty appearance in their new uniforms. They appeared for the first time with white belts and regulation New York clubs, and were the recipients of generous applause.

Next in the procession came the Grand Marshal and his aids, mounted, and following them came the Patriarchs Militant Band, which discoursed popular music along the way.

Then rode General C. S. Sherman and staff, and they were followed by Colonel W. H. Sherburne and staff, also mounted, and the Capital City Drum Corps filed in the interval between them and Cantons and Stockton Ladies' Drill Corps, which, resplendent in neat uniforms, were objects of comment and the recipients of unstinted applause all along the line.

At the Pavilion fully 3,000 people were gathered to witness the entertainment and drill promised them. Over 1,000 occupied chairs on the lower floor, and the rest took places in the gallery.

The Sacramento lodges, I. O. O. F., followed the visitors, and closing the parade, were carriages bearing members of the order who were too infirm to march in line.

At many points along the streets strogo colored lights were thrown on the marching line, which greatly added to the spectacular effect.

THE GRIFFO-McCARTY MATCH

BOTH BOXERS READY FOR THE FIGHT TO-NIGHT.

They Are in Perfect Condition, and Believed to be Evenly Matched.

Everything is in readiness for the Griffo-McCarty glove fight to-night under the auspices of the Sacramento Athletic Club and in its larger and more commodious hall at the new Pavilion at Sixth and M streets. There is no better arranged hall anywhere for an event of this kind, as every seat commands an unobstructed view of the ring in the center of the hall. Fully two thousand persons can be accommodated with good seats.

Griffo and McCarty both came to the city yesterday from San Francisco, where they had been doing their training. Professor Schenk examined the men yesterday and pronounced them to be in the finest possible fettle for a lively and prolonged contest such as the men are expected to put up.

A member of the committee in charge of the arrangements for the fight went to San Francisco on Monday and visited the training quarters of both Griffo and McCarty. He saw the former skip the rope 180 times and the latter bag for eight three-minute rounds. He says it was a revelation to see the clever Australian champion batter the bag. Griffo's manager, Crowley, held a watch on him, but the time-piece was not called on for the fight is so thoroughly skilled that he saw him quit the instant the three minutes were up, sat in his corner exactly sixty seconds and then rushed at the bag again.

Leaving Griffo's training quarters, the club's representative called on McCarty at the gymnasium of the San Francisco Athletic Club. There he saw him with Aleck Greggains, the clever heavyweight, and Frank McConnell, the welterweight who was given the decision over Griffo before the Olympic Club.

McCarty's record shows him to be a foeman worthy of a man in his class. He fought a draw with Griffo in Philadelphia, a draw with Owen Ziegler, knocked out Jimmy Barron in six rounds, fought a six-round draw with big Billy Stiff of Chicago, an eight-round draw with Joe Bernstein of New York, and knocked out Jimmy Lovett in three rounds at Baltimore. Several of these men are out of his class.

Griffo's seconds to-night will be Aleck Greggains, Frank McConnell and Frank Schuler of the San Francisco Olympic Club, and Griffo will be attended by Charles Felman, Charles Brown and "Sandy" his mascot.

The committee states that any of the club members who so desire can see McCarty work in the gymnasium from 2 to 4 o'clock this afternoon. Griffo will be at it from 9 to 10:30 in the forenoon. Yesterday Griffo worked an hour and a half in the gymnasium with a "turning a hair." Those who saw him perform declare him to be the cleverest man they had ever seen.

There will be two preliminary bouts to-night by the best boxers of the club, commencing at 8 o'clock, and the main event will begin at 10 o'clock. Reserved seats can be had at Kimball & Upson's, 625 J street, at any time today.

QUARANTINE CERTIFICATES.

FRUIT MEN OPPOSE THE SENATE MEASURE.

Resolutions Adopted by Recent Horticultural Conventions in the South.

Secretary B. M. Lelong, of the State Board of Horticulture, yesterday forwarded copies of the following communication to each of California's Senators and Congressmen: "Dear Sir: I have the honor of transmitting to you the following resolutions relative to H. R. bill No. 6894, concerning national horticultural quarantine, adopted by the fruit-growers of California in convention assembled at Los Angeles April 12th, and at Riverside April 11, 1898, to wit: (Los Angeles Resolutions)."

"Resolved, That we request our Representatives and Senators to work for and secure the passage of the original Senate bill on fruit and tree quarantine, recommended by the national convention held at Washington, D. C., March 6 and 7, 1897.

"Resolved, That we oppose as inimical to our interests House bill No. 6894, which provides for quarantine certificates valid in all places in the United States, which are to be made on inspection in foreign ports that cannot be deemed discreditable to the United States.

"Whereas, H. R. bill No. 6894 now before Congress is inimical to the agricultural interests of this country; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the fruit-growers of the State of California, in convention assembled at Riverside April 14, 1898, hereby protest against the passage of H. R. bill No. 6894, but we favor the passage of an international agricultural quarantine bill without interstate restrictions."

NICARAGUA CANAL. Secretary Lelong also transmitted to Senators White and Perkins the Nicaraguan Canal resolution adopted at the Los Angeles convention. The letter of transmission and resolution follows: "Dear Sir: I have the honor of transmitting to you the following resolutions relative to the Nicaragua Canal, adopted by the fruit-growers of California in convention assembled at Los Angeles April 11, 1898, to wit:

"Resolved, That this convention of fruit-growers, assembled this 11th day of April, 1898, at Los Angeles, at the call of the State Board of Horticulture, impressed with the belief that the future of their industry depends on the improvement of transportation facilities, demands from the Republican party the redemption of the pledge made in its platform of 1896 as to the owning and operating of the Nicaragua Canal.

"Resolved, That Senators and Congressmen of all political parties to unite to further such legislation as shall tend to the immediate construction of this canal."




