

CONGRESSIONAL PROCEEDINGS.

Senate Making Good Progress on War Revenue Bill.

Jones of Arkansas States the Views of the Democratic Members.

Maintains That Taxes Imposed by the Pending Measure Ought to be Levied on Property and Not Upon Consumption—Two Important Bills Affecting Labor Passed in the House.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Considerable progress was made by the Senate today in considering the war revenue measure. Jones of Arkansas presented in a general statement the views of the Democratic members of the Finance Committee. He maintained that the taxes imposed by the pending bill ought to be levied on property, and not upon consumption; that the policy of the Republican party had always been to impose taxes upon consumption, while the idea of the Democratic party was to impose it upon property. He believed that taxation that would raise \$150,000,000 would be amply sufficient to be carried by this bill, and that if the exigencies of the war should demonstrate that more money was needed Congress could provide it later. He opposed the proposition to issue bonds and certificates of indebtedness in excess of the requirements of the war, and held that the expenses should be paid by the Government as the war progresses.

The Senate Chairman in his invocation today paid a tribute to those who suffer at home through the horrors of war. Hale, Chairman of the Committee on Naval Affairs, offered the following resolution, which was agreed to: "That the President be and after April 21, 1898, and to the date of the passage of this joint resolution, of the officers of the line and staff of the navy are hereby ratified and confirmed to continue in force during the exigency under which their services are required in the existing war. Officials so required shall be assigned to duty with rank and pay of the grades established by existing law, and shall be paid from the appropriation for 'pay of the navy.'"

A bill was reported from the Military Affairs Committee by Carter of Montana, and passed, providing that pay and allowance of the volunteers enlisted in the United States army shall begin on the day of their enrollment at the State camps, with a provision that volunteer troops sent to the Philippine Islands may draw one month's pay in advance. It was explained that the bill applies only to those who had as volunteers enlisted in the United States army.

On motion of Allison consideration of the war revenue measure was resumed, Jones of Arkansas taking the floor. Jones said that he doubted whether there was a man in the Senate who was not ready to vote all the money and taxes necessary to carry on the present war. He would not perform his duty, he thought, if he should vote for too much money. The problem presented was how much money is needed.

Jones called attention to the statement of Secretary of the Treasury Gage that the additional expenses of the war, over and above the current expenses of the Government, would be about \$25,000,000 a month, a total of perhaps \$300,000,000 in a year. Secretary Alger had informed the Finance Committee that the extraordinary expenses of his department would be about \$150,000,000. He thought this amount sufficiently liberal. Secretary Long had presented to the committee a carefully prepared statement showing that the war expenses of his department would be about \$75,000,000. Allowing \$15,000,000 for extra expenses, the full amount needed by the estimates of Cabinet officers was, according to his figures, in the neighborhood of \$240,000,000. This amount was, of course, in addition to the ordinary expenses of the Government.

IN THE HOUSE.

Two Important Bills Affecting Labor Passed.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The House today passed two bills affecting labor. Two important bills affecting labor were passed, one limiting the labor of persons employed upon Government works and in Government service to eight hours daily, and the other providing for the equipment of a non-partisan Labor Bureau to investigate and report on legislative problems affecting labor.

When the House met today Davenport of Pennsylvania, from Elections Committee No. 1, called up the report in the contested election case of W. Godfrey Hunter vs. John S. Rhea, from the Third Kentucky District. The report favored the sitting member, and without discussion was adopted. The contestant, Dr. Hunter, is now Minister to Guatemala.

Corliss of Michigan called up the House bill to repeal the law providing that a transmission of the electoral vote of the States to Washington shall be by messenger. The bill proposes transmission by mail and express, and was urged by Corliss in the interest of economy. The present method costs \$2,000,000 every four years.

The bill was defeated after a prolonged discussion, in which many members participated. The House then took up its bill to limit to eight hours each day the work of laborers, workmen or mechanics employed in the service of the Government or upon public works by contract or otherwise.

The bill was amended so as to suspend its operations as affecting military and naval work in time of war, and was passed without division. The House passed a bill to authorize the appointment of a non-partisan commission to collect information and recommend legislation to meet problems presented by labor, agriculture and commerce.

The bill proposes a commission of five members from the House and Senate, respectively, and nine others representing different industries and employments, to be appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. The House then adjourned at 2:45 p. m.

McGreys Not Among the Killed.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The State Department has received a dispatch from Ambassador Hay, stating that the McGreys are not among the list of missionaries killed in Africa. He says that if they are stationary at Rabbel, they are safe, as it is forty miles from the place of the massacre. The United Brethren of Christ asked the department to ascertain if the McGreys were safe.

CHAMBERLAIN'S SPEECH.

The Marquis of Salisbury Declines to Discuss It.

LONDON, May 17.—In the House of Lords today the Liberal leader, the Earl of Kimberley, questioning the Government as to its intention in regard to Wei Hai Wei, referred to the recent speech of the Secretary of States for the Colonies, Joseph Chamberlain, saying the alliance mentioned by the latter could only have been an alliance for mutual defense against Russia, and asked if the matter was so far advanced "that we may soon hear of a grand alliance with a European power." He explained that he could not conceive of any alliance with the United States, because it would be contrary to the policy of the latter which has always pursued, adding that the Government had made such approaches in the direction of an alliance that ere long the House may hear of its conclusion, nothing more was likely to prevent its conclusion than Mr. Chamberlain's speech.

The Marquis of Salisbury, in reply, declined to discuss Mr. Chamberlain's speech, on the plea that he did not have it in his hands. Referring to Wei Hai Wei, the Premier declared that that port had been occupied to "encourage Chinese reform and to show Japan and Corea our naval power."

Continuing, the Marquis of Salisbury said the Government's policy was the development of commerce and friendly relations with all nations.

PALO ALTO BRED HORSES.

Five Head Sold at Cleveland Brought a Total of \$16,550.

CLEVELAND (O.), May 17.—The Fasig horse sale, which began at the Cleveland Driving Park to-day, promised to develop into the greatest sales event of recent years. The offerings from Palo Alto farm, the property of Mrs. Leland Stanford, come first, and five head sold during the morning brought a total of \$16,550. Betonica, 2:10 1/2, brought \$7,800, and was bought by Senator Frank H. Jones of Portsmouth, N. H. Betonica made his record as a three-year-old, and at the same age paced a trial in 2:06 3/4. Senator Jones also bought the colt Idolita, by Wenderino, for \$4,700. This is the largest price paid for a two-year-old in several years.

The great mares Pasante, 2:13, and Peko, 2:11 1/4, were bought for Cleveland horsemen. George W. Saunders paid \$2,000 for Pasante, and Charles Tanner bid off Peko for \$1,000. The filly Nordeau, 2:17 1/4, also brought \$1,000. J. McCarthy of Boston being the purchaser.

THREE MISSOURI MURDERERS.

Sentenced to be Hanged on the Twenty-second of June.

JEFFERSON CITY (Mo.), May 17.—Division No. Two of the State Supreme Court to-day sentenced three convicted murderers to hang on June 22. They are Ed. McKenzie, colored, convicted of killing Nick Linhardt, a wealthy farmer at Lohman, for his money, on the night of April 30, 1896; Toke Lahanan, colored, convicted of killing Miles Gaines in Jefferson City on Christmas night, 1896, after outraging her, and John Thomas Schuetz, convicted of killing his sweetheart, Annie Rauwh, in St. Louis on April 6, 1897.

Catholic Knights and Ladies.

ST. LOUIS, May 17.—The fourth biennial convention of the Catholic Knights and Ladies of America met here to-day, with 125 delegates present. After appointment of committees a recess was taken to enable the delegates to take an excursion about the city. Officers elected for the coming year will be elected at this convention. At Exposition Hall to-night Archbishop Kane welcomed the delegates, and there were other addresses.
